Krista provided a very informative presentation on fire safety, fire prevention and protection. I want to thank our Fire Chief Lindsay Tighe and our Administration for organizing this engagement for our people. With all the fires around us, we need to be cognizant of the potential risks that we my face if the fires begin to spread into our territories. LNIB Communications will be providing information to our communities on what to do if we must deal with fires. LNIB is committed to providing the best fire suppression protection for our community's as is possible. 

LOWER NICOLA INDIAN BAND LAND CODE

Land Code is a way for First Nations to independently manage reserve lands and resources. A Land Code is a document created by First Nation communities to replace multiple sections of the Indian Act that relate to land management. Once a signatory to the Framework Agreement on First Nation Land Management, a Band has the ability to create a Land Code that outlines how the community will work together to develop laws and policies for governing and managing their reserve lands and resources. LNIB members voted and

approved the LNIB Land Code in August 2016 and the Land Code came into effect on December 1. 2016. For more information about LNIB Land Code visit the Lands Department online at:

LNIB LAWS

BY LNIB MEMBERS

The Lands Department is currently undertaking the development of LNIB Laws. The Land Code allows Chief and Council to create a wide variety of laws effective on Lower Nicola Indian Band reserve lands. The process for making LNIB laws is described in Section 7 of the LNIB Land Code, and includes a proposal to Council, public posting, community engagement and consideration of members' input, and approval by Council majority vote. LNIB Law development is driven by the need to address members' issues in a fair and consistent way, by providing guidelines and processes for staff to follow.



LAND USE PLAN

Lower Nicola Indian Band is currently developing a Land Use Plan (LUP) for its reserve lands to provide guidance for housing, economic development, community facilities, and infrastructure. An initial draft has been prepared based on the input of the community, staff and Lands Management Advisory Committee. The development and adoption of the Land Use

Plan is an important component of implementing the land code. It will provide guidance on what reserve land should be considered for development and what areas should be protected from development. TRADITIONAL HOLDINGS PROJECT

The Traditional Holdings Project team continues to work towards the resolution of Traditional Holdings or Custom Family Lands. These are lands to which members have asserted an interest or right, but are not formally recognized as allotments. An allotment application draft that aligns with LNIB values,

protocols, and preferences expressed during Phase 1 community engagement has been created. A draft plan for a decision-making body and a dispute resolution process has also been formulated. Updates to laws and draft documents can be found online at Inib.net/lands after being reviewed by the Lands Management Advisory Committee (LMAC).

RENT-TO-OWN HOUSING AGREEMENTS

The Lands and Housing
Departments have been working
over the last year to identify Canada
Mortgage and Housing Corporation
(CMHC) homes that have been fully
paid but have not been given a
Certificate of Possession (CP). The
Lands and Housing Departments
have been able to identify priority list
for allotments of the CMHC home

lots that are eligible to receive a Certificate of Possession (CP) under the LNIB Rental Housing Policy. Next steps will include notifying the members of their eligibility, compiling documents for allotments and completing new surveys as needed. TESTING FINDS CONTAMINANTS IN **ILLEGAL CANNABIS**

Public Safety and Solicitor General

Testing of cannabis seized from illicit retailers in B.C. has found that many samples contained contaminants that would not be allowed in the legal cannabis market.

"My message to people who choose to consume cannabis is simple: buy from legal sellers whose regulated product is subject to national requirements that are in place to protect you," said Mike Farnworth, Minister of Public Safety and Solicitor General. "In addition to the potential health risks, if you buy illegal cannabis, you could also be supporting organized criminal operations that pose a danger to our communities."

As part of a pilot study, the B.C. Cannabis Secretariat sent 20 dried cannabis samples, seized by the provincial Community Safety Unit from illicit retailers in the Metro Vancouver region, to a federally licensed analytical testing lab in February 2021. Twenty-four distinct pesticides were found in the illicit cannabis samples, along with unacceptable levels of bacteria, fungi, lead and arsenic.

The frequency and variety of contaminants identified indicate that some growers producing for the illicit market may be engaging in practices that pose risks to both consumers and employees handling cannabis.

Cannabis products from licensed producers are strictly regulated to ensure they are fit for human consumption. They must meet federal regulations. including mandatory testing for the presence of solvent residues and contaminants such as pesticides, fungi, bacteria and heavy metals. In contrast, very little is known about the quality of cannabis sold on the illicit market or production practices used by unlicensed growers in Canada.

The secretariat carried out the pilot study with assistance from the BC Centre for Disease Control and the National Collaborating Centre for Environmental Health. The latter has authored a blog post, Unregulated Cannabis: Risky Production Practices Raise Concern for Consumers, which discusses the test results.

LNIB SECURITY **SURVEY RESULTS**

The Lands Department would like to thank you for your feedback about security on LNIB lands. The LNIB Securiguard Security Survey is now closed. Here are the results.

From the 51 LNIB members who completed the survey, 49 currently live on reserve land. All members agreed that there is a need for security. Most members know of Robert Moses Jr. and his role as a security guard, but would like to know more about Securiguard itself. All members said that they feel comfortable going to Robert with

safety and security concerns and there is a need for security on LNIB reserve lands.

Mentioned by members in the survey: The community feels safer and has less drug issues and theft. There is better protection against break-ins. vandalism and mischief during both day and nigh time hours. Less trespassing and illegal dumping has been noticed since LNIB Security was introduced. Keep it up!

More details about the Security Survey can be requested from the Lands Department.

- 2. Building reputation and capacity of First Nation companies and JV partners, including mentoring for local companies on strategies and practices to enhance their ability to qualify for more opportunities.
- 3. Profit sharing with the nation to fund community improvement projects and educational scholarships.




