WINTERIZING HOSES




REMINDER

With temperatures starting to drop and colder days, and nights, ahead we would like to take this opportunity to remind you that it is time to detach your garden hose from your outside tap.

If you haven't already done so, please, think about doing it in the next few weeks. As overnight temperatures have started to dip close to freezing.





If you leave the hose on and it freezes it can cause the internal workings of the faucet to crack. This is what causes those leaking outside faucets come spring time.

Also if there is an independent shut off for your outside faucets we strongly recommend turning them off over the winter. This will further ensure no damage to the outside faucet and reduce any risk of it leaking inside your home.

hen'te? Band members and community members. I hope each of you are doing well during these extreme times. As we embark on the month of December, it is difficult how to feel and how to comprehend everything that is going on in our valley. I have had numerous discussions with Band members, Band staff, community members and residents of the Merritt/Nicola Valley and much of what is discussed is where do we all go from here? It is absolutely heart wrenching to see what is happening here locally, but also down the lower mainland. The loss of life, land, wildlife, and infrastructure is unimaginable

to say the least. The sad thing is that the rain does not seem to want to go away. Countless hours have been consumed on our highways, bridges, waterways and in the city of Merritt to try and get to a normalcy that we all have not seen in quite some time.

Our valley had not even had the opportunity to recover from the devastation of our summer fires, our 215 children that were discovered, and of course the continuance of Covid-19. There has not been any opportunity for our community to share and celebrate the National Day for Truth and Reconciliation to commemorate the legacy of the Canadian Indian Residential school system. Where do we go from here? Where do we begin to pick up the pieces in the wake of all this devastation? Our neighbors from the East and West of Shulus have been hit awfully hard with life changing catastrophe. Mother nature, our creator is sending us a message. Global warming is definitely showing its teeth for all of us to see. As a community, it is time that we begin the process of adequate emergency preparedness for whatever the future may


hold.

LNIB has been extremely fortunate that the extreme flooding has not heavily impacted our lands and infrastructure. That is not to say that we are out the woods with mother nature and so we must be diligent and mindful that our environment is still at a stage of unpredictability. Evacuation alerts and orders are still very possible as we trudge through these dark times and so it is particularly important that we all stay prepared in case alerts or orders are issued.

Please have a bag packed and ready with clothing and essentials for a minimum of 72 hours. Please keep your medication and other bare necessities nearby. We need to be prepared at a moments notice if mother nature decides to shift water flows. It is especially important to be prepared. I feel that it is fair to say that since the fires of the summer that we cannot take anything for granted. LNIB is doing its best to update leadership and our community's when public information is dispelled. There has been some comments that have come to my attention that LNIB communication to its members needs to be better. All that I ask is please patient and LNIB will do its best to get any updated information out to our community's as quickly as is possible.

On that note, I want to commend LNIB staff, leadership, and volunteers for all their demanding work during these challenging times. LNIB is doing all that we can at this time with food issuance, cash disbursement and other support services for both our on-reserve members and more importantly, our off-reserve members who were evacuated from the City of Merritt. LNIB leadership and our staff cannot do this work alone. We need membership support as we fight through these calamities.

We are all in this together. Please take care of your friends and your families, but most importantly, please take of yourself.



EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Dear LNIB Members,

It's hard to believe it is already time for our December newsletter. On reflection, 2021 was more difficult than 2020 when LNIB and the rest of the world was faced with COVID 19; this year we have been challenged not only with COVID; we've also had to endure devasting wildfires, and now flooding. In saying that, I also want to thank all the community members and staff who have supported not only LNIB getting through the past year but the evacuees from other communities as well - your dedication has not gone unnoticed.

Here are some of the things we were working on in November:

Human Resources: Band buildings are open to the public and we have set out some Covid-19 safety protocols for staff and membership to follow to keep the distance. We are committed to keeping the community and employees safe during this pandemic. The Chief and Council passed a motion adopting a Mandatory Vaccination Policy for all staff. This policy requires all LNIB staff to be fully vaccinated by December 20, 2021. If you would like clarification on this policy you can reach out to Lloyd Loveday, Director of Human Resources.

The flooding from the Coldwater River affected LNIB staff. Thirty LNIB staff were forced to evacuate on November 14th and 15th from the City of Merritt and surrounding area. This forced us to pivot to remote servicing in some sectors, however, most buildings are again open for business. The staff that can make it into work are in the offices.

We have some new team members to introduce this month: LNIB welcomes Melissa Gilbert Oppenheim, Home Support worker, Jordan Harris, Homemaker, Macus Ong, Habitat Stewardship Coordinator, and Sharon Williams, Care Aid.

Committees and Liaisons: Lands Management Advisory Committee met November 10, 2021. School Board met November 3, 2021. Finance and Audit Committee met November 22,2021. Joeyaska Contaminated Site Litigation Advisory Committee did not meet in October. Human Resource Policy and Procedures Review Committee met on November 17th. All committee meetings are open to the membership to join. Please contact the band office for details on how to join the meetings.

Community Meetings and Workshops: The next Band General meeting is tentatively scheduled for January 31, 2022 at 6:00pm virtually.

Support to Chief and Council: Chief and Council met November 2nd and 16th. Chief and Council also called an emergency Special Chief and Council meeting on November 18th. Chief and Council will meet December 7th and 21st. Should you

require anything on the Chief and Council agenda scheduled for December please contact Sondra Tom and me. Also, the Chief and Council meetings are open to membership to join via online or telephone. Please contact Sondra Tom or me to be added to the email invitation for the scheduled Chief and Council meetings.

I wanted to share a Christmas Fruit Bar recipe with you, from my family to yours

Base: ½ cup butter 1 cup of flour 2 tablespoons icing sugar

Mix the butter flour and icing sugar and press into a 8 x 8 baking dish and bake at 350 F for 5 minutes

Topping: 2 eggs

- 1 cup brown sugar ¹/₄ cup flour
- $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon baking powder
- ¹/₄ teaspoon salt
- 1 cup chopped walnuts
- 1 cup chopped up maraschino cherries
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla

Mix all topping ingredients together and pour on top of the base layer, bake at 350 F for 45 minutes then let cool

Frosting:

- ¹/₂ cup soft butter
 - ³/₄ cup icing sugar
 - 2 tablespoons milk
 - 2 tablespoons boiling water
 - Vanilla to taste

Cream butter and sugar, add milk while beating, then add boiling water a little at a time while beating slowly, beat until stiff and fluffy (about 5 minutes). Once the topping layer is completely cooled add the frosting and enjoy.

LAND CODE

ANNUAL REPORT

Council shall, within 30 days of receiving an audit report, prepare and table with the Lands Management Advisory Committee, an annual report on LNIB Land management which shall include: (a) an annual review of land management activities; (b) a copy and explanation of the audit report as it applies to LNIB Land; and, (c) such other matters as may be determined by Council or the Lands Management Advisory Committee.

ACCESS TO INFORMATION

Any Member may, during normal business hours at the main administration office of LNIB, have reasonable access to: (a) the register of Laws; (b) the auditor's report under section 40.4 [Duty of auditor]; (c) the budget or supplementary budget referenced in section 38.8 [Supplementary Budget], and (d) the annual report on lands issues in section 41 [Annual Report].

COPIES FOR MEMBERS

Any Member may, during normal business hours at the main administration office of LNIB, upon payment of any reasonable fee set by Resolution, obtain a copy of the auditor's report, annual report on LNIB Land management, budget or supplementary budget.

LAND CODE DEFINITIONS

"**Council**" means the Chief and Councillors of LNIB or any successor elected government of LNIB.

"LNIB" means the Lower Nicola Indian Band "LNIB Land" means any portion of a reserve of LNIB that is subject to the Land Code.

"Land Code" means this Lower Nicola Indian Band Land Code.

"Lands Department" means the department of LNIB that administers the day to day operation of LNIB Land and the Land Code.



"Lands Management Advisory Committee" means the Lands Management Advisory Committee established under the Land Code.

"Lands Manager" means the person employed or otherwise engaged by LNIB to oversee the day to day operations of the Lands Department and the administration of the Land Code.

"**Member**" means an individual whose name appears on the Lower Nicola Indian Band Membership List.

WILLS & ESTATES

The Wills Project has been delayed due to recent events that have affected the Nicola Valley and Lower Nicola regions. Participating members will be contacted soon to continue drafting their wills with the lawyer. A new Wills Depository was recently setup so that members can safely and securely store their original will in a fireproof filing cabinet at the Lands office. If you would like to know more about the new LNIB Wills Depository, please email Kristopher Por or call the office at (250) 378-5157. For questions and helpful information about wills and estates planning, members are encouraged to contact the Lands department.

Executor or Administrator?

It is important to communicate with LNIB and provide copies of appointment documents so that the Lands team can verify and share relevant information with you. Research is conducted by the Lands team as files are digitized and archives accessed so that complete reports can be produced to help settle estates and land disputes. Members can contact the Lands team at any time to review pertinent documents, maps, and historic records. Find more information on the LNIB website under the Wills & Estates link.

LNIB MEMBERS WILLS AND ESTATES PLANNING

What is an estate?

An estate includes real (immovable) property, (e.g., land and buildings or structures), and personal (movable) property, that someone owned or had in their possession when they died. Anyone who owns something has an estate. These assets can include items such as: a home, car(s), bank accounts, stocks, bonds, mutual funds, life insurance policies, retirement plans, business interests, furniture, jewellery, art work and collections.

What is a will?

A written document that gives instructions on what is to be done with an estate after death. If someone dies without a will, section 48 of the Indian Act sets out how the estate will be distributed. If someone dies without a will it is called dying intestate.

Who is an administrator?

A person appointed (by the Minister) to administer an estate. If there is no will or

no one is stated in the will the Minister will appoint someone to handle all the legal and financial matters of the deceased's estate. It is not possible to have more than one appointed administrator.

Who is an executor?


A person named in the will to administer (handle all the legal and financial matters) the deceased's estate and to ensure that the details of the will are carried out. This is the same as an administrator or a personal representative. It is possible to have more than one executor named in a will.

Who is a beneficiary?

Persons (e.g., child, cousin, or friend) or organizations (e.g., church or animal shelter) specifically named in the will to inherit from the estate.

Who is an heir?

Person(s) who may inherit from the estate of someone who died without a will (e.g., spouse, children, parents, and other relatives).

SECURITY

Lower Nicola Indian Band has been working with Securiguard to offer a program of security monitoring within its reserves near Merritt. A trained security guard has been travelling around the reserves in a marked SUV to monitor issues reported by residents, such as noise and nuisances, illegal dumping, and general safety concerns. ALLOTMENT AND CUSTOM FAMILY LANDS LAW

The Lands Department will propose the ratification of an Allotment and Custom Family Lands Law and this law will define a procedurally fair process for assessing members' claims to Traditional Land Holdings or Custom Family Lands. The decision-making body will be defined in the law and will be structured to ensure impartiality. LNIB needs to create an Allotment and Custom Family Lands Law because there are currently no guidelines for a procedurally fair and transparent process for transferring reserve land parcels to LNIB Members. The right to possess Custom Family Lands is not legally recognized in the Land Code but it is recognized within the LNIB community. The existence of Custom Family Lands is the source of many lands' issues.

Turkey Glaze Recipe

Serve a traditional roast turkey for Christmas with a sticky glaze to add flavor and golden color to a turkey.

For the glaze:

- 4 tbsp Honey
- 1 tbsp Dijon mustard
- 1 tbsp Red wine vinegar
- ~ Rub turkey in butter to keep moist.

~ While roasting the turkey, mix all the glaze ingredients in a bowl.

~ Hour before the turkey's cooking time is done, brush the skin generously with half the glaze. Continue to roast for another hour, glazing twice more, until cooked all the way through and the glaze is sticky and caramelized.

~ Leave to rest for at least 20 minutes

~ Save the juices to make gravy.



Power Outage Checklist

Before the lights go out:

- Have flashlights with extra batteries handy
- Charge all your mobile devices
- Have a battery-operated radio
 - This allows you to listen to your local station for warnings, advice, and instruction
- Inspect your chimney or flue
 - This helps prevent structural fires and ensures smoke, carbon monoxide and other potentially harmful gases are properly vented
- Make sure you have an adequate supply of food and water
 - Food in your fridge and freezer is <u>usually</u> <u>safe to consume</u> if the power is out for less than four hours
 - Fireplaces, wood stoves, barbecues and camp stoves can be used outdoors for emergency cooking. DO NOT use barbecues or camp stoves indoors

How to Keep Your House Warm Without Electricity:

6 Easy Tips:

1. Block Up Cracks and Crevices.

Small cracks and crevices around windows and doors can let in more cold air than you think.

2. Wear Plenty of Layers. When the temperature in your house drops, you can keep yourself warm by wearing more clothes.

3. Use Candles (Safely)

Place several candles together on a table for a neutral heat source.

* Always be safe when using candles, and never place them near flammable materials or somewhere they could easily fall over. Make sure all candles are put.

4. Have Blinds Open in the Day and Shut at Night.

When the power is out, ensure windows are uncovered in the day to get as much warmth from the daylight as possible. At night, close the blinds to trap warm air inside and stop any drafts from getting in. 5. Keep Yourself and Pets Warm with Blankets.

As well as wearing layers of clothing, use extra blankets to keep your body temperature up in the evenings and at night. Don't forget that any four-legged friends will also need to be kept warm without electricity, so offer them an extra blanket or two.

6. Use Water Bottles

If you can heat water on a gas camping stove or candle, put it in a water bottle for a heat source that will last a few hours. You can do the same with bags of beans. Put one by the fire and then use it to snuggle up with.

HOME SAFETY IDEAS FOR RURAL PROPERTIES

We understand that there are growing concerns in the community which are impacting people's ability to feel safe while enjoying the comfort of their own homes on the Lower Nicola Indian Band Reserves. In order to help people feel safe, we wanted to pass through some easy and cost-effective tips that may help to decrease unwanted guests and increase safety.

1) Meet the Neighbours

Getting to know your rural neighbours can work wonders. They will be able to keep an eye on your property when you are not around, and they can alert you or the proper authorities if they notice any strange activity taking place. Living in an area where everyone looks out for everyone else will definitely keep you, and them, safer.



2) Lock It Up

It goes without saying that you need to lock up your home when you are away, but you should also do the same thing when it comes to your garage and storage sheds. Thieves know all the best areas to look, so they will target places where you might store power tools, small engine equipment and other items of value. If you have a house alarm, it is advisable to have your garage and shed connected to the alarm system, if possible, too as an extra deterrent for opportunistic criminals.

3) Ensure Property Looks Lived In

Your property needs to look lived in even when you are away. If you have more than one vehicle, park one out in the driveway. Install automatic timers so that lights turn on and off at appropriate times. Ensure that your property is well maintained by ensuring that routine jobs, such as mowing the lawn, tending the garden, and picking up the mail, are done. This will obviously be much easier if you have a neighbour or family member who can help out when you are away.





HOME SAFETY IDEAS FOR RURAL PROPERTIES

4) Fortify Your Home

A home security system is a great idea, but other measures should be taken to make it harder for criminals to get inside your property. This can be accomplished by installing deadbolt locks, yard gates and lock, and motion detection lights.



5) What about property that is stored outside the house?

Thieves are often more interested in what is outside a house than what is inside. Store ATVs, snowmobiles, and other recreational toys in a locked barn, shed or storage area. It is best to disable machines and store the removed piece of the machine in another location so your ATV cannot be easily rolled away.



A few more safety-first tips for rural homeowners

The best defence: A fence around your property, plus a sturdy gate at the driveway (or laneway entrance) can help to deter trespassers. Keep the gate locked even if you are at home.

Do not confront a perpetrator: Consider your safety if you come across a crime in progress. Personal property can be replaced, people cannot. Call 9-1-1.

Ensure address awareness: Make sure your kids know your physical address. It should be visible at the end of your driveway—to help first responders.





Hello, we have started up the good food bag program again at the LNIB Community Services. The good food bag program is to promote healthy eating with a variety of produce at an affordable cost.

Each of the bags cost \$20.00 and they will include different types of vegetables and fruits depending on what is available at the time. For the rest of 2021 these are the date that the good food bag will be ready

- November 16, 2021
- December 14, 2021

If you are interested, please come to the front desk at the Community Services building by the last Friday of each month to sign up and pay for the following months good food bag. If you have any allergies, please let the front desk know when you are signing up.

If you are on Social Assistance there is a separate form you can fill out for the cost of the good food bag to be deducted from you monthly cheque.

Canada's Food Guide to Healthy Eating recommends eating 5 to 10 servings of vegetables and fruit each day. Many families in the Nicola Valley rely on the Good Food bag program to supply the vegetables and fruits needed for good health.

What is the Good Food Bag?

- Is a non-profit fresh fruits and vegetables bulk buying program.
- You can be sure your family eats healthier.
- Enjoys the benefits of cooperative bulk buying.
- Supports your community.

What might be in a typical bag(s)?

- Fresh fruit and vegetables.
- Potatoes, carrots, onions
- Celery, lettuce
- Apples, oranges, bananas
- Other vegetables or fruits that might be in season.

Can anyone participate?

- Yes, If you Eat, You qualify
- Because the Good Food Bag is not a charity, but a bulk-buying program, it empowers people by giving them access to high quality produce.

NLAKA'PAMUX ENVIRONMENTAL MANAGEMENT PROGRAM

This December update for the Nlaka'pamux Environmental Management Program is on the Priority Value Selection Process.

The Priority Value Selection Process started by taking all Community Value data, which were compiled over the past 9 month through community engagement and document review, and grouped these by Theme, Value, and Sub Value. Once all Values were organized a series of Value Rating Questions were asked, as follows:

- 1. Are there measurable, practical indicators for tracking the value?
- 2. Is the value local or territory-wide?
- 3. Does the value cover more than one theme?
- 4. Is the status of the value changing?

Values with the highest number of Yes responses were ranked as Priority Value. The figure above shows an overview of the Priority Value Selection process.

With some Priority Values selected, the NEMP program focus has changed.



We are conducting research and compiling information on these Priority Values to understand their current status in the Nlaka'pamux Territory. As work on the phase of the program progresses, we will establish some linkages between values and collect information on the lower priority values. We intend to provide updates on this progress at future community engagement sessions


