Lower Nicola Indian Band is well positioned economically in the Nicola Valley and there is a lot that we can do on our own, but I believe it is equally important and valuable that we build a strong network with the City of Merritt, the Thompson Nicola Regional District (TNRD) and our neighboring Nations. I am hoping that we can build and strengthen these relationships during this term. Thanks again to all the dignitaries that were able to attend our ceremony.

Enclosing, I want to acknowledge the new Chief and Council once again. There are exciting times on the horizon for our community. With the recent purchase of Tunkwa Lake Resort, there are great ideas and suggestions coming forward about how to enhance the resort and indigenize it. Unfortunately, we have to reschedule our community meeting to a later date due to deaths in our community but stay tuned as to when our community meeting will be. scheduled to. Message from the Executive Director

Dear LNIB Members.

I am pleased to present our monthly report for December 2022. LNIB continued to be busy on several initiatives.

Here are some of the things we have been working on:

First Nations Drinking Water Settlement: The Chief and Council passed a motion at the September 20, 2022 Council Meeting, to accept the Settlement Agreement of the individual class members who were residents on a Lower Nicola Indian Band reserve while a long-term drinking water advisory was in force on that reserve during the period applicable in the Settlement Agreement.

We will provide more detailed information on how to make a claim as well as answer questions at the next Band Meeting. In the meantime, please take a look at the following link, there is some excellent information on this website: https://firstnationsdrinkingwater.ca/

Tunkwa Lake: Lower Nicola Indian Band acquired Tunkwa Lake Resort Ltd. effective October 14, 2022. The opportunity to purchase Tunkwa Lake Resort first came to Chief and Council on August 16, 2022. The decision was to submit a Letter of Intent to purchase through Counsel and a Project Team. Tunkwa Lake Resort has eighteen lakefront acres with a main lodge, 19 rustic cabins, 2 luxury log cabins, 79 RV sites, caretaker's residence and room to expand. This team is in place to ensure operations of Tunkwa Lake Resort continue during the transition of ownership. Tunkwa Lake Resort employs 5 fulltime staff and there are 48 annual pad rentals. There will be continuous updates regarding the operations of Tunkwa Lake Resort.

Ground Breaking Ceremony: LNIB had a Ground Breaking Ceremony on November 2, 2022 for the 14 unit Rapid Housing Project that will be built in Rocky Pines. This initiative is through Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation (CMHC) and their Rapid Housing Initiative. The 14 Units will consist of eight one-bedroom, four two-bedroom, and two three-bedroom units in the two storey building. This will help reduce the housing waiting list. The housing is set to be completed September of 2023.

RCMP Incidents: On Tuesday, November 15, 2022, Lower Nicola Indian Band, the City of Merritt and Coldwater Indian Band faced an urgent police incident. Administration acted fast to ensure the safety of membership and instructed membership to stay in their homes and to close all LNIB public buildings. RCMP acted quickly and determined the three separate incidents were targeted and the public were not at risk. Within the hour, administration was able to retract the instructions to membership to stay in their homes and LNIB offices were able to open with minimal interruptions to the day.

Remembrance Day Ceremony: Nicola Valley First Nations Veterans Association had a Remembrance Ceremony on November 11, 2022 at the Shulus Cenotaph. The ceremony was well attended by families of veterans within the Nicola Valley. LNIB School also had a ceremony on November 9, 2018 that will help teach the children the importance of honoring our Veterans.



Human Resources: While visiting or receiving services at other buildings, please feel free to ask the staff member you are visiting to use a mask and to adhere to safety protocols if you are concerned. We are committed to keeping the community and employees safe during this pandemic.

We'd also like to welcome a new member to our team at LNIB: Wenona Bearshirt, Communications Coordinator. The staff who moved on to new endeavors is Paul Robillard, Mindy Garcia, Mackenzie Berry and Tanya Bent. LNIB thanks them for their contribution to the LNIB Team.

Committees and Liaisons: Chief and Council need to appoint chairs to the committees so there are no committee meetings in November. All committee meetings are open to the membership to join. Please contact the band office for details on how to join the meetings.

Community Meetings and Workshops: The Band General meeting was scheduled for November 28, 2022 will be rescheduled out of respect for the Pierre and Isaac families.

Support to Chief and Council: Chief and Council met November 1st and 15th. Chief and Council orientation meetings were postponed out of respect for the families of membership who passed on. Chief and Council had a Public Swearing in Ceremony on November 17 2022 that was attended by dignitaries from the four First Nation's Chief and Council and City of Merritt. Strategic Planning is scheduled December 20-21, 2022. Should you require anything on the Chief and Council agenda scheduled for December please contact Sondra Tom and me. Also, the Chief and Council meetings are open to membership to join via online or telephone. Motion #11-15-2022-06 Reads: The Lower Nicola Indian Band Chief and Council WHEREAS the Lower Nicola Indian Band operates under the authority of Chief and Council; WHEREAS:

A. Since 2019, LNIB has participated in negotiations and early engagement activities with Teck Highland Valley Copper Partnership ("HVC") and the BC Environmental Assessment Office ("EAO") concerning the environmental assessment of the Highland Valley Copper 2040 Project (the "Project") under the Environmental Assessment Act (the "Environmental Assessment");

B. LNIB has received notice from the EAO that the Project will proceed to the "Process Planning" phase in the Environmental Assessment, and that LNIB is to confirm its involvement as a participating Indigenous nation going forward by issuing the EAO a letter indicating the same;

C. LNIB has previously entered capacity funding arrangements with HVC through a Collaboration Agreement to support LNIB's participation in the Environmental Assessment, and has agreed to a project workplan with the EAO to coordinate LNIB's engagement and participation; and D. LNIB Council has determined that it is in the best interest of LNIB and its membership that LNIB

participate in the Environmental Assessment as a participating Indigenous Nation in order to engage with HVC and the EAO and to advocate for and protect LNIB's rights and interests in respect of the Project.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

1. The continued participation of LNIB in the Environmental Assessment is hereby authorized; and 2. Chief Stuart Jackson be and hereby is authorized and empowered to execute and deliver in the

name and on behalf of LNIB a letter to the EAO indicating that LNIB will participate in the Environmental Assessment, and to do all such further and other acts and things as may be necessary in order to carry out the intent of these resolutions. Motion Carried

Motion #11-15-2022-07 Reads: The Lower Nicola Indian Band Chief and Council hereby:

1. Supports the application request to Environment Climate Change Canada under their Expression of Interest for Indigenous Led Area Based Conservation program;

2. Recognizes that this funding application fits under the Strategic Plan – Lands #2.Remain stewards of the land and protect our Rights and Title; this program will allow LNIB to explore asserting our presence in areas across our traditional territory where we currently do not have jurisdictional authority; further this community engagement process for potential sites will allow LNIB to record traditional knowledge and stories on the land across our territory;

3. Supports the budget request to Environment Climate Change Canada in the amount of \$173,900, and;

4. Supports the LNIB cash contribution amount of \$47,000.00 to this project;

5. Supports the LNIB in-kind contribution amount of \$23,000.00 to this project;

6. Chief and Council authorize Kukpi Stuart Jackson and Kari Reilander to sign any documents for this application process.

GATES & SECURITY CAMERAS

The Lands Department is responsible for the management and protection of all LNIB reserve lands. To prevent unlawful activity including dumping of hazardous materials and waste, as well as improper use of LNIB land, four gates were installed on Nicola Mameet IR1 in September of 2021.

SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT PLAN

After hours of hard work was done to cleanup various environmentally contaminated areas on LNIB land, multiple gates were put in place to protect reserve lands.

INSTALLATION OF CAMERAS

Security cameras are planned to be installed during 2022 near important areas and locations of interest. These cameras are for security purposes only and will not interfere with the privacy of neighboring homes, businesses, and communities. If you know of any areas of concern, please contact us and we can see about getting a camera setup. The use of trail cameras is the best strategy for sites where it would not be appropriate to restrict access by installing a gate. See more details about this project by visiting the Lands Portal online.

Members' use of the land will not be restricted by gates but may need to obtain access codes from the Lands Department. Contact the Lands team if you require access to use land that is behind a locked gate.

Victor Alfred (Monzie) York Eulogy

Good morning, Family, Friends and Community members. My name is Linden Pinay, I have been asked to deliver a Eulogy for Victor. Thank you, Johnny Jackson, for the opening prayer smudge. Before I begin, I want to share some words of appreciation, on behalf of Victor, Jean and his family, for the many individuals who assisted Victor over the past several years as he battled Cancer. I can tell you today that he beat the odds and fought bravely. He was diagnosed in February 2016 with the disease. Thank-you to Scarleth Zwez-Ruiz, community health nurse, and the staff who assisted with transportation to and from the clinic and hospital. Even during Covid the health services staff were there to assist and support Victor. Also, a thank you to LNIB Health staff for their support and checking in on Victor

Dr. Proctor at the Cancer centre in Kamloops and Dr. McLeod, his family physician in Merritt, were his primary care doctors and assisted Victor through the many challenges created by this disease and 6 years of chemotherapy. Victor received some of the best health care available and his journey was supported by many friends and family members who were there when needed. Thank-you to Alex Kinasewich of Spences Bridge, a friend to both Victor and Jean, who helped with home modifications and transportation. His wife Jean, Alanna Cowan, Chad York, Moose (Randy Coutlee) who stood by him and were always ready to rush him into Merritt Hosptial, sometimes in the middle of the night.

Victor was blessed to have so much support. He received many visitors and well wishes during his hospital stays and for all those friends and supporters, the family says THANKS.

I want to also talk about the summer and fall of 2021 when Mother Nature decided to shake things up. Fires and Floods. The first evacuation, during the summer of 2021 was caused by local forest fires, that began in Lytton and Nicomen and evacuation orders were issued at Cooks Ferry. Victor and Jean relocated to Gail and Hyrum Petersons for most of the summer and when power was restored, they returned to 7 mile. On November 15th the flash flooding destroyed portions of highway #8, and Victor, Jean, Chad, Alanna, grandson Lonny, Albert and partner Guy stayed home that first night while power went out and watched the river rise in front of their homes. The following day, while a helicopter was called in to lift them out; short of the clothes on their back and their pets, they were not able to bring any belongings. Chief Christine Minnabariet was quick to respond to the flooding, declare an emergency and arrange a helicopter lift from 7 mile to Cooks Ferry Band on Highway #1. The first stop was Kamloops Travlelodge funded by provincial emergency services, the Red Cross, Scw'exmx Child, and Family Services Society assisted and relocated them to the Delta Marriot. They went back to Lower Nicola to family homes and eventually stayed with Gail & Hyrum Peterson for most of 2022. New housing at Cooks Ferry ANTKO LANDS on the Coldwater rd. Is where they spend this Christmas.

I asked Victor how he was managing, and he said just roll with it. He got involved with the Friendship Center, Scw'exmx Child and Family Services and local elders' group in Merritt. He kept busy. Victor was born to Josephine Coutlee and Eddie Murdoch in 1942. He was adopted by Edna and Albert Yorkand had 5 siblings. Joespehine later married John Shuter. He had a large extended family and relations. Victor was 80 years old.

I think he self described his early years, when he created a brochure for his coffee business. He said "He grew up in Merritt, his father worked for the Canadian Pacific Railway and his mother took jobs cleaning homes. Victor started helping to support his family at the age of nine delivering papers. He talked about growing up on the other side of the tracks" but I never knew where those tracks were. He played hockey, chess, and many sports as a young guy.

His first career was as a barber and bartender in Merritt. He talked about those years as good times. He would point out his job sites. I cut hair at this building. I worked at the Coldwater Hotel. Victor married Jean Albert in 1973, they raised 3 children together. Chad, Alanna and Albert. He also had a daughter, Shelia Monkman who is living in Northern Alberta today. Victor and Jean lived in Merritt, Kamloops, and Vancouver.

Vancouver is where I first met Victor in 1980. I relocated to Vancouver and started to look for a summer job. I found the Native Employment Centre in Blood Alley, Gastown of Vancouver. Victor was an employment Counsellor and we both got hired by the federal government as summer workers. We travelled across BC that summer to promote the hiring of aboriginal people into Canada Employment Centers. Our summer supervisor was Chief Bernard Charles of the semiahmoo First Nation in Whiterock.

He introduced me to crab eating in Whiterock and we eventually travelled to Prince Rupert with stops throughout the province. I quickly learned that Victor knew a lot of people. He was involved with the BC Metis association, the non status Indian group and a founding member of the Conayt Friendship Center in Merritt. That summer job with Victor turned into a year long work and Victor would spend the next 10 years working for the federal government. His work as an employment counsellor led to other opportunities. He was manager of Student services at NVIT for 7 years and active in promoting NVIT. He also worked as a drug and alcohol counselor.

His wife Jean attended UBC Nitep and eventually received her Masters Degree in Education. Victor received an Honorary Bachelor of Education from Nitep at UBC.

Eventually, he regained his status in Lower Nicola under Bill C 31 and in 1993 he was elected as Chief of Lower Nicola. I was in Prince George at the time he invited me to come work with him once again. We had some fun. It began in the basement of Shulus Hall with a small staff. He really wanted to shake things up and so we started building. New housing in Rocky Pines, a record 28 units in one year. Fire department, Health Center, Arbour and eventually this new school. We settled the Mamit lake road dispute and created six new reserves additions.

Introduced a tax bylaw and put the province on Notice that taxes they had been collecting belonged to Lower Nicola. By 1995 my journey took me to Ottawa, but we managed to continue to work together at the Assembly of First Nations. I was always amazed at how easily he made friends and friendships where ever he travelled. We stayed friends over the years and travelled together to Vegas in 1994. He was enamored with the idea of the Band owning a casino remember receiving a personalized CD from Bobby Curtola saying let's do this.

We travelled to the Yukon, to Ottawa, and Phoenix Arizona and I am glad I got to share some of his journeys, from employment counsellor to Chief to Coffee master.

He loved coffee and said, Linden one day I want to own my own coffee roaster and retire and roast coffee. We travelled to Seattle to attend a coffee show and he studied all aspects of coffee industry. Well, he did it. He started Coquihalla Coffee and set up a small enterprise at 7 mile, built a coffee house, bought a roaster and trained in the United States. Amazing coffee but I am sure he gave away as much as he sold. He was a generous guy. He taught me a lot about coffee and I enjoy a cup a day.

He also loved ART. Especially western art and cowboy art. We attended a western art show in Seattle in the early 80's and I got hoooked on Western art. His son Chad is an artist and musician. We had many conversations about western art. I am grateful to the many pictures I was gifted by Victor.

He was a pipe carrier and a traditional person who knew his culture and language. He loved his culture; he loved his family. He loved his community. I am thankful we were friends. Today we are here to celebrate Victor's life and I know you are going to hear from several more speakers, who had a connection with Victor. He had an incredible journey; He was a fighter. Really, I was amazed at how he managed so many lifestyle changes to deal with his recent battle with Cancer. He faced adversity bravely, did not complain and remained a friend to so many. I want to thank Jean and family for allowing me to share with you today. I lift my hand to VIctor, to his family. Thank you.

Easy Citrus Shortbread Cookies



Ingredients

2 cups all-purpose flour ¹⁄₄ teaspoon baking powder ¹⁄₈ teaspoon salt 1 cup butter, softened ³⁄₄ cup confectioners' sugar 2 teaspoons vanilla extract
½ teaspoon almond extract
1 tablespoon grated orange zest, or more to taste
2 cups sweetened dried cranberries, chopped

Directions

- Combine flour, baking powder, and salt in a bowl; set aside. Beat the butter and confectioners' sugar with an electric mixer in a large bowl until smooth. Stir in the vanilla and almond extracts and orange zest. Mix in the flour mixture until just incorporated. Fold in the cranberries; mixing just enough to evenly combine.
- Divide the dough into 2 equal portions, then roll into logs about 7 inches long. Wrap each log in wax paper or plastic wrap, and chill in the refrigerator for at least 4 hours.
- Preheat an oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C).
- Remove wax paper, and cut the cookie dough into 1/2-inch slices. Arrange the slices on a baking sheet about 1 inch apart.
- Bake in the preheated oven until firm but not browned, about 10 minutes.
