

Dear LNIB Members,

I am pleased to present our monthly report for May 2023. LNIB continued to be busy on several initiatives.

Here are some of the things we have been working on:

Covid-19 Financial Aid: Chief and Council passed a motion on January 17, 2023 to do a final Covid-19 financial aid to all registered band members in the amount of \$300.00. Forms are available to fill out at the Band Office you can also phone and request the form be filled out over the phone. As of May 25, 2023 there were 984 payments processed out of 1,426. Leaving 442 members who have yet to apply and receive their payment. Encourage your family members to phone the band office for assistance in submitting their application. This is a benefit to on and off reserve members phone the band office if you require assistance filling out your form.

Upcoming Training and Workshops: LNIB Sponsored Driving Lessons an application can be submitted to Steve Wilks and you wait for your approval then your lessons can be booked. Indigenous Agriculture Training Program

opportunities coming up in July and August will be Farm Equipment Training/Safety, WHIMIS, First Aid, Food Safe, Introduction to Bee Keeping, Food Preserving, Growing Food Crops and Green House Course. Watch for details for these opportunities. Hospitality Work Skills and Training Program will be in Hope July 3-9, 2023. There are many more opportunities arising keep checking the website for updates.

First Nations Drinking Water Settlement: The Chief and Council passed a motion at the September 20, 2022 Council Meeting, to accept the Settlement Agreement of the individual class members who were residents on a Lower Nicola Indian Band reserve while a long-term drinking water advisory was in force on that reserve during the period applicable in the Settlement Agreement.

PROJECT UPDATE: SECURITY CAMERAS AND GATES

The Lands Department is responsible for the management and protection of all LNIB reserve lands. To prevent unlawful activity including dumping of hazardous materials and waste, as well as improper use of LNIB land, four gates were installed across Nicola Mameet IR1 in September of 2021.

SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT

After hours of hard work was done to cleanup various environmentally

contaminated areas on LNIB land, multiple gates were put in place to protect reserve lands.

CAMERAS

Security cameras were recently installed near important areas on reserve. Cameras are intended for security purposes only and will not interfere with the privacy of neighboring homes, businesses, and communities. The use of trail cameras is the best strategy for sites where it would not be appropriate to restrict access by installing a gate.

Members' access to reserve lands will not be restricted by gates though some areas may require gate codes. Contact the Lands Department during regular office hours to obtain a code.

NOTICE TO COMMUNITY MEMBERS ON WILDLIFE SAFETY

Please refrain from leaving hunting remains, animals' entrails or trimmings up Mamit Lake Branch Road or anywhere near the community / residential areas.

Animal remains attract predators, leaving remains from a hunting trip too close to the community habituates the predators to keep returning for more food. Predators such as coyotes, bears and wolves will keep returning where there is food available to them.

Attracting additional predators into the community will create an unsafe environment for children, pets, and all members of the community.

Please relocate hunting remains or animal innards outside of the community by leaving them far away from residences or known industry.

An alternative to Mamit Lake Branch Road could be up highway 97C, past the industrial park.


PURPLE AIR MONITOR – AIR QUALITY INDICATOR



Please be advised that a public Purple Air Monitor is available online for anyone to check the quality of the local air in real-time. This monitor provides local health advice based on the current quality of the air.

Using the Monitor

A purple air monitor was installed at the Lands and Economic Development office on October 4th, 2022. It is an air quality monitor that measures PM2.5 (particulate matter) in the local airshed.

When you open up the map, scroll to Nicola Mameet and select the sensor labeled: LNIB Lands and Economic Development Office Building. A graph should come up to show air quality trends over time. If you hover your mouse over the bottom left legend, it also has information on health indicators, showing real time data how air pollution conditions and how that may affect public health. The graph itself is interactive and units of measure can be changed, please see the "How to use the Graph" highlights in blue on the top right portion of the graph.

Air Quality Index

The Air Quality Index (AQI) on the Purple Air Monitor is defaulted to use the U.S. AQI but this setting can be changed in the graph to any AQI preferred.

"Think of the AQI as a yardstick that runs from 0 to 500. The higher the AQI value, the greater the level of air pollution and the greater the health concern. For example, an AQI value of 50 or below represents good air quality, while an AQI value over 300 represents hazardous air quality." Source: AQI Basics

Air Quality Index (AQI) Values	Levels of Health Concern	Colors
0 to 50	Good	Green
51 to 100	Moderate	Yellow
101 to 150	Unhealthy for Sensitive Groups	Orange
151 to 200	Unhealthy	Red
201 to 300	Very Unhealthy	Purple
301 to 500	Hazardous	Maroon

Particulate Matter

"Particulate matter (PM) refers to small solid or liquid particles floating in the air. These particles can be made up of different substances like carbon, sulphur, nitrogen, and metal compounds.

Generally, smaller particles are thought to be more harmful to health than larger particles. Small particles can move deeper into the respiratory tract, including the lungs. For this reason, fine particles that have diameters less than 2.5 micrometers (PM2.5) are linked to more serious health effects than larger particles. PM2.5 is about one-eighth the diameter of a human hair."

"How can particle pollution affect my health?

Particle pollution can affect anyone, but it bothers some people more than others. People most likely to experience health effects caused by particle pollution include:

People with heart or lung diseases (for example, asthma)



01 - 30 April 2023 Progress Report

Overall weather for the month of April at Merritt was "cooler and drier" than previous years. The monthly mean temperature of 5.6° C was 0.8° C colder than the 5-year (2018-2022) average and recorded precipitation totals were less than the 5-year average for April.

Winter snowpack for the southern TNRD area, as measured in the Similkameen watershed is averaging just 80% of normal. Nicola Lake, Douglas Lake, Nicola River (Upper and Lower) and Coldwater River levels are all well below flood thresholds.



Initial surveying and monitoring of larval development sites began on 17 April 2023. Permanent and standing water habitats (tire-ruts, depressions) were active throughout the program areas. Several sites in the Douglas Lake Cattle Ranch Home Ranch (DLR) and Quilchena areas were active with larval development. Several large, permanent ponds and snowmelt enlarged marshes surrounding the DLR home ranch were treated by air on 21 April with 181 kg of VectoBac 200G.


A total of 34 inspections were completed and a total of 34.90 kg of VectoBac 200G were applied from the ground to 15 sites to control developing larval populations. The majority (13/15) of the larval development habitats observed as active during the second half of the month were located in the Douglas Cattle Ranch and Quilchena areas. Two sites located off Tolman in the Lower Nicola Valley were active when sampled on 20 April. The great majority of snowmelt sites typically observed in farm fields were dry this April.

MONTHLY INVASIVE WEED SPOTLIGHT



DESCRIPTION:

This large yellow flower grows from a single stem emerging from a taproot. The plant has a milky white sap when broken and the leaves have a grass-like appearance, long thin and green. The weed has a single flower head per plant, growing up to 7cm tall with bright yellow flowers. They bloom during mid spring; the seed head resembles a very large dandelion puff also known as 'pappus'. This invasive weed spreads via seed distribution, each flower can produce up to 1000 seeds, the plant dies off after seed production, so prevention of seed formation is key!

ORIGIN:

This invasive weed originates from Europe and South Africa, brought to the US and Canada during the 1900's as an ornamental flower.

CONTROL OPTIONS:

Mechanical Control

- Hand Pull the rosettes; if the taproot is left the plant will regrow.
- Till in Spring to remove plants & taproots, Mowing will only encourage more growth.

Chemical Control

 Herbicide Application of Dicamba, metsulfuron methyl + aminopyralid, chlorsulfuron + metsulfuron methyl, 2,4-D + dicamba or metsulfuron methyl <u>alone</u> are all viable options for chemical treatment.

Disclaimer - ALL herbicide application should be applied as spot spraying; broadcast spraying may negatively impact other vegetation in the area & harm sensitive ecosystems.

Herbicide application within 5m of a body of water (seasonal or not) is prohibited.

LNIB requesting that the application of herbicide to treat half an acre or more, is carried out by a person holding a valid BC Pesticide Applicator Certificate. Before selecting and applying herbicides, you must review and follow herbicide labels and application rates; municipal, regional, provincial, and federal laws and regulations; species-specific treatment recommendations, and site-specific goals and objectives.


ATTENTION HOUSING TENANTS

Please be advised that according to the Lower Nicola Indian Band Animal Control By-Law there is a limit on the number of animals per dwelling. Every home is only allowed to keep <u>A MAXIMUM OF 4 ANIMALS</u> consisting of dogs and cats or similar sized domestic animals with <u>A MAXIMUM OF 2 DOGS</u> per house. The multi-plex buildings including the 8-plex and 4-plex buildings are not permitted to have any animal living in the units. Also, all pets are to be vaccinated and should be spayed or neutered. We want to provide a safe environment for our members as well as their animals.

RE: Module Craning at 2794 Cougar Crescent, Lower Nicola

Dear Neighbour,

We are writing to provide an update on the upcoming construction activities taking place at 2794 Cougar Crescent. We are well underway on the foundation construction and will be facilitating a couple of key activities between June 12-23rd, which may have impacts to the community.

Part of the modular construction build process involves "transportation and craning", where we will transport 'modules' or pieces of the building, and position them to be hoisted into place with a crane. Transportation and craning or the modules may cause a slight disruption to street access while we bring the modules to site.

Transport access will continue from Aberdeen Road, turning right onto Saskatoon Lane, and then right onto Cougar Crescent. The trucks will drive past the site a short distance prior to backing into the site. This work is anticipated to begin the week of June 12th.

What you should be aware of:

- No parking on the streets in front of the address above or along the site
- Heavy equipment and wide trailers with need more space when moving through the area. Please be mindful of potential delays.
- Work will be performed between 7:00am and 6:00pm
- Local residents will be notified in advance of any parking restrictions.
- The work is subject to weather however we will work to keep local residents updated on any schedule changes.



HOUSING: WORK ORDER PROCESS

The Housing Department would like to clarify the levels of urgency on home maintenance and repairs and what type of timeframe you will be looking at for our Maintenance Team to attend your residence. The Housing Department being notified will only be considered when you have called, texted, or e-mailed the **Housing Department Administrative Staff**.

Emergency Repairs will be assessed and rectified within 24-48 hours of the Housing Department being notified. Examples of Emergency Repairs are listed below:

- major leaks in pipes or the roof;
- · damaged or blocked water or sewer pipes or plumbing fixtures;
- · the primary heating system;
- · the electrical system;
- deficiencies to the integrity of the structure; and
- any other damage that poses an immediate and urgent jeopardy to the Rental Unit or to the health and safety of persons

Mid-Level Repairs will be assessed within 1-2 weeks of the Housing Department being notified. Examples of Mid-Level Repairs are listed below:

- Running Water (faucet dripping, leaking hose bibs etc)
- Appliance Repairs or Replacements
- Plug-ins not working
- Bathroom Fan not working

Low Level Repairs will be assessed 30 days or more of the Housing Department being notified. Examples of Low-Level Repairs are listed below:

- Non-Essential Light Fixtures not working
- Furnace Filter Replacement
- Replacement of interior doors/doorknobs
- Functional toilet repairs (toilet is functional to use but requires repairs)
- Flooring Repair
- Non-Essential Major Renovations
- Drywall Repairs

Please understand that these time frames are "best case scenario" and we may have issues with supply chain and/or contractor availability that may cause delays. The Housing Department works hard to ensure all of our homes are healthy and safe but as more work orders are called into the office sometimes our priorities have to be modified.

As always, we appreciate your patience when these situations do arise and if you see our maintenance team out in the community be sure to give them your best smile and wave!



It's Time to Test for Radon

Now is the perfect time of year to test your home for radon!

What is radon?

Radon is a colourless, naturally-occurring gas that comes from the soil in all parts of the world. You never know what the levels of radon are in your house unless you test – your house could have very different results from your neighbour's. Most homes will have some level of radon.

Why is radon a concern?

As radon levels increase, so too does the risk of lung cancer. Radon is the second leading cause of lung cancer in Canada after smoking, and when combined with tobacco smoke exposure, the risk goes up even higher.

How do I know if I have radon?

The only way to know the radon level in your house is to test. The test involves placing a small plastic "puck" in the lowest-occupied level of your home, and then just waiting! Over time, radon will make a mark on the inside of the detector. A lab will count these marks and translate them into a radon concentration. It's best to leave the detector in place for a longer period of time (up to one year) to get a good average reading. If a shorter testing period is used (at least three months), it's best to test during the colder, winter months when people send more time indoors with the windows and doors closed.

FNHA will work with your community to provide everything needed to test your home for radon: we will supply the detectors, and in many cases can even come to place them in your home and collect them after the testing period. We will also provide shipping to get the detectors to the lab, and will interpret the results for you and provide advice on next steps.

What happens if I have high levels of radon?

Health Canada has different recommendations for action depending on how high the levels are. If levels are above 200, we recommend that you take action within two years. If they're over 600, we recommend action within one year.

Reducing radon levels is generally a fairly straightforward process that involves allowing the gas from under the building to vent through a pipe, so it doesn't stay in your home. Indigenous Services Canada can often provide funding for this work in communities, in coordination with your Housing Department.

Students can lose two to three months in reading achievement every summer, as well as two months of grade-level equivalency in math skills. This concept of learning loss is referred to as "the summer slide". If your child does not have summer learning opportunities, this learning loss will accumulate each year. There are affordable and free options for summer learning that parents should explore through schools, libraries, and non-profit organizations. Summer learning is not just important for young children, but for teenagers as well. There are many things you can do as a parent to help your child stay on track to academic success during summer vacation starting with researching learning opportunities in your community and planning daily learning activities.

Enhanced Service Coordination contact

- The Jordan's Principle Enhanced Service Coordination model ensures that there are dedicated community-based service coordinators to assist Indigenous families and guardians with the navigation of the whole range of federal and provincial services and supports (education, health, and social), including submitting Jordan's Principle requests on their behalf.
- The model also includes a BC <u>Jordan's Principle Service Coordination Hub</u> to act as a province-wide resource for service coordinators by providing on-going training, tools, and a community of practice.
- Service Coordination can be offered virtually, over the phone, and when possible, in-person.

Capital CHRT 41

- By virtue of 2021 CHRT 41, First Nations and First Nations-authorized Jordan's Principle service providers can access funding for the purchase and construction of capital assets needed to:

 provide safe, accessible, confidential and culturally- and age-appropriate spaces needed to support the delivery of Jordan's Principle services on-reserve.

What is eligible?

- The purchase, construction or renovation of a capital asset must be underway and/or ready to proceed, and support spaces that are safe, accessible, confidential, and culturally and age appropriate, and used for the delivery of Jordan's Principle services to eligible First Nations child(ren) on
- Where Jordan's Principle services are delivered off reserve. white Stridar's Fillichie services are delivered in teserve, pre-capital planning funding for off-reserve capital assets to support such delivery are also eligible. In other words, if the asset will be located off reserve, it may be eligible for precapital planning funding (e.g. needs assessment or feasibility

Jordan's Principle – BC Region

Named in memory of Jordan River Anderson, a young boy from Norway House Cree Nation in Manitoba (KinosaoSipi, בּילא ב'^, '). On February 2, 2005, Jordan River Anderson passed away in hospital at the age of 5 before the provincial andfederal governments could agree on who should pay for his home care in a medical foster home. As a result of the funding dispute, Jordan was never able to return to his home community. Jordan's Principle is a legal obligation, which means it has no end date. Jordan's Principle will support First Nations children for generations to come. This is the legacy of Jordan River Anderson.

What is Jordan's Principle?

- Jordan's Principle is a needs-based initiative that provides funding to First Nations children and youth to access the products, services and supports they need, when they need them, regardless of whether they live on or off reserve.
- Jordan's Principle ensures the best interests of the child, including their physical, emotional and psychological safety, security, culture and well-being are important considerations in taking action and making decisions.
- Jordan's Principle recognizes that First Nations children may require government services that are not typically available to all other children in BC in order to ensure substantive equality, culturally appropriate care, and/or to safeguard the best interests of the child.

Who is eligible?

- A child from birth up until their 19th birthday (age of majority) in BC, is eligible for Jordan's Principle, if the child permanently resides in Canada and meets <u>one</u> of the following criteria:

 - is registered **or** eligible to be registered under the *Indian Act;* has one parent **or** guardian who is registered or eligible to be registered under the *Indian Act;* is recognized by their nation for the purposes of Jordan's Principle; OR

 - is ordinarily resident on reserve.

How to apply?

Jordan's Principle Request Form <u>can be downloaded</u> from the Jordan's Principle website, or requested from the BC Region team. This form will be used to indicate consent and eligibility:

	Consent: (written or oral) from the child's parent/guardian or from the youth if they are legally able to make decisions regarding their care (16 or older in BC)

Group Requests

Group Requests are appropriate when the needs of children/youth seeking services are more effectively met in the context of the collective needs of a defined group.

Who can a Group Request be submitted for?

- a group of children (more than one child) within one family, or from multiple families/guardians with specific needs;
- a group of children with specific needs within the same community, or under the care of the same organization/educational institution.

What are common Group Requests?

- Requests to contract professionals to provide services for groups of children (e.g. Occupational therapy, Physical Therapy, Speech and Language, Cultural Services, Behavioural Therapy etc.)
- Requests for specialised individuals to assist a group of children in education or social contexts (Shared Education Assistants, Youth Mental Health Workers)
