

Message from the kwúkwpi? Stu Jackson

hen'le? band members and community members. I hope everyone had a great ring into the New Year! The holiday season usually tends to come and go very quickly. One minute you're on holidays and the next minute you are back at work. I hope everyone had the opportunity to get in some relaxation, time with friends and family, and time for yourself.

Chief and Council met twice this month to conduct the necessary business for the band. As we are getting closer and closer to the end of the fiscal year, it is very important that Council continues to meet as regular as possible these next few months. Band administration will be doing their best to ensure that all financial responsibilities are adhered to and appropriate monies are expended before the end of March 2024. LNIB also had our monthly community meeting just the other evening as well. Although the turnout was rather light attendance wise, there was some valuable information presented to the band members that were present. We had a presentation from a group called Canadian Solar. David Marieno met with band membership to discuss solar energy opportunities to LNIB. David had met with Chief and Council previously and Council felt it was important to present information to the band membership. Canadian Solar is hoping to work out a partnership/agreement with LNIB in the very near future. I feel there is great opportunity if LNIB considers delving into solar development. The revenue streams could prove to be very lucrative and very promising for LNIB's future. We keep band membership informed as we continue working with Canadian Solar.

Band membership also had the opportunity to meet and listen to Chad Henderson who is the current president of Infracon. Infracon is a joint partner with LNIB through a company named Lower Nicola Site Services, which is 51% owned by LNIB. Chad did a presentation

to band membership of the some of the projects that are currently underway with Lower Nicola Site Services (LNSS). LNIB also has ownership rights to another pipe integrity company named Ogilvie Mountain Holdings (OMH). Chad spoke about OMH and some of the work that this company is also doing where LNIB does benefit from. There was some positive developments that came out of Chad's deliberation, however, there is much more work and improvement that need to be undertaken as well. Comments ensued around employment and training opportunities for band members with these companies. Currently the employment of band members with these companies is respectable to some extent, but there was comments from the audience that more band members should be working for LNSS and OMH. We agreed that we need to meet with these partners more regularly and get more updates.

Chief and Council held an orientation session this month as well. In this session, Council met with a company that is working with LNIB. This company is named Ausenco. Ausenco is currently working with LNIB to address the future of the Highland Valley Copper Mine. Generally speaking, Highland Valley Copper Mine is currently scheduled to shut down in 2028. In saying this, there has been understudy and work put forth to potentially expand the life of the mine to 2040. Currently, LNIB has an agreement with Highland Valley Copper Mine what is called an Impacts Benefit Agreement. This agreement was signed in 2016 between the mine and LNIB. With the possibility of a mine expansion, LNIB has conducted the necessary work, with Ausenco to assess this potential mine expansion. A lot of work has already been done to address this possible expansion and more work needs to ensue as we move forward at the LNIB level. I hope to invite Ausenco to our next community meeting to discuss the nature of this possible expansion, speak to possible impacts and socialize these issue to the membership. Keep an eye out on any updates regarding Highland Valley Copper Mine, Ausenco and Lower Nicola Indian Band.

I just wanted to inform all of you that LNIB lost a very important person. Our dear Gloria Sam passed away on the evening of January 22nd. Many of you knew Mrs. Sam as Gloria. Gloria is my auntie, but I only knew Gloria as Mama Sam. Sincere condolences to my family, Wendy Leonard (Tweedy), Kyle Sterling, Jerry, Jeanette, Nikki and Gavin Sam, Gail Joe, Amy, Mark and Maya Smith, Erica and Jared Collen, Darren Joe and Timothy Sam. Mama Sam will be missed by many. Lots of love to each of you.

First Nations Drinking Water Settlement: The Chief and Council passed a motion at the September 20, 2022 Council Meeting, to accept the Settlement Agreement of the individual class members who were residents on a Lower Nicola Indian Band reserve while a long-term drinking water advisory was in force on that reserve during the period applicable in the Settlement Agreement.


Community Meetings and Workshops: The next Band General meeting is scheduled for February 26, 2024.



Motion #01-16-2024-11 Reads: The Lower Nicola Indian Band Chief and Council WHEREAS:

A. On December 15, 2023, Lower Nicola Indian Band ("LNIB") completed its purchase of 2893 Aberdeen Road, Merritt, BC, legally described as PID 013-160-656, DISTRICT LOT 1638 KAMLOOPS DIVISION YALE DISTRICT EXCEPT: (1) PARCEL A (DD 63394F) (2) PLANS 36370 AND KAP53517 (the "Property") through 1374678 B.C. Ltd. (the "Corporation"), a corporation whose shares are legally owned by Arthur Dick, Stuart Jackson and Connie Joe on behalf of LNIB as beneficial owner.

- B. The Property is located next to the western boundary of Nicola Mameet Reserve No. 1 (the "Reserve"). The top portion of the eastern boundary of the Property is separated from the Reserve by a long driveway (the "Existing Driveway") that provides access from Aberdeen Road to 2897 Aberdeen Road (the "Maunu Property"), which is owned by Jack Earl Maunu ("Maunu").
- C. A covenant registered in the Land Title Office under No. KH109450 (the "Covenant"), a copy of which is attached to the briefing note presented to Chief and Council, requires Maunu to transfer the Existing Driveway to LNIB if LNIB provides an alternative access route to the Maunu Property across public roads on the Property.
- D. Council of LNIB wishes to authorize the Executive Director of LNIB to negotiate and enter into a legally binding agreement (the "Maunu Agreement") with Maunu pursuant to which LNIB and/or the Corporation would agree to provide alternative access to the Maunu Property by means of a driveway over part of the Reserve between the Maunu Property and Aberdeen Road (the "Alternative Driveway"), rather than by means of public roads on the Property, in exchange for Maunu transferring the Existing Driveway to LNIB, which agreement will contain the following additional terms and conditions:
- 1. LNIB will at its cost construct the Alternative Driveway and grant Maunu the necessary legal rights to use the Alternative Driveway;
- 2. Maunu will transfer the Existing Driveway to LNIB at no cost to LNIB;
- 3. the Maunu Agreement will be subject to Thompson Nicola Regional District agreeing to discharge the Covenant from title to the Property and the Maunu Property on the transfer of the Existing Driveway to LNIB;
- the Maunu Agreement will be subject to approval by LNIB's Council;
- 5. the route of the Alternative Driveway will be subject to approval by LNIB's Lands Management Advisory Committee; and
- 6. any other terms and conditions the Executive Director considers prudent.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT:


- 1. The Executive Director be and is hereby authorized to negotiate, finalize and enter into the Maunu Agreement on behalf of LNIB and/or the Corporation.
- 2. The Executive Director be and is hereby authorized to approve, execute and deliver the Maunu Agreement and all other documents and instruments, with such changes as she may approve (such approval to be evidenced conclusively by her execution thereof), and to do such further acts as may be necessary to give effect to these resolutions.






In December 2019 students in Mrs. Ens' Grade ½ class at Lower Nicola Band School wrote Christmas letters to the Canadian Armed Forces. Notice to all LNIB Members and Community Members

SNOW REMOVAL

The roads have been divided into the following three snow removal priority categories:

PRIORITY 1: These are arterial and major collector roads, generally with a right- of- way width exceeding 30 feet and average daily traffic greater than 2,000 and includes approximately 9 lane kms. Included are roads serving emergency response facilities and schools

PRIORITY 2: These are generally minor collector roads, typically with a pavement or gravel width of at least 20 feet. Included in this category are roads serving lower volume traffic and can include streets with hills and sharp curves where traction problems may cause hazardous driving conditions and includes approximately 11 lane kms.

PRIORITY 3: All other roads not designated as either Priority 1 or 2 streets and includes approximately 10 lane kms of gravel. Included in this category are roads that are on hills.

Please remember, it is dangerous and difficult to plow narrow streets that are congested with parked vehicles. Plowing around parked cars limits the effectiveness of snow removal activities. Some narrow streets may not be plowed if equipment cannot safely drive down them. The most helpful thing residents can do to facilitate snow removal is to move vehicles off the street and encourage their neighbors to do the same.



Safe Winter Walking

The Public Works Team do their best to clear snow and ice as quickly as possible. You may find some areas are slippery as you make your way across the parking lot and roads. It is important to be aware of the hazards and to take steps to minimize the risk of injury. Practice safe winter walking to help you stay on your feet this winter. Be sure to Report snow covered or icy sidewalks and roadways to Public Works by calling 250-378-5157 or the on-call phone at 250-315-8184.

Prevention of Slips, Trips and Falls

- Do the penguin shuffle: point your feet outward like a penguin, take short shuffle like steps
- Concentrate on keeping your balance. Be sure to walk slowly
- Walk in designated areas Stay in cleared sidewalks
- Avoid carrying loads that obstruct your view consider wearing a backpack
- Allow yourself additional time to get to your destination
- Use handrails from start to finish
- · Keep your eyes on where you are going
- Step-don't jump from vehicles or equipment
- Don't text and walk at the same time

Greeting from garden crew Lorna & Kat.

New Harvest Station: We are so proud to show you pictures of the new harvest station that was built at the Shulus Garden this year. Thanks to **Farm Credit Canada** for donating the funds that paid for the cement pad, a woodshed kit converted to a harvest shed with doors, drainpipes, electricity and indoor lights, counter tops and a sink, rain barrels, drain system. We recycle the water because it is the water, we used to rinse garden vegetables with and can be recycled to water fruit trees and such.

Worm farm is still very active, so if you want to start your own worm farm, we can give you a hand full of red wiggler worms for your farm.

Nicola Valley Beekeepers Club: Monthly meeting on February 12th, 7:00 to 8:30 pm, at Shulus Hall. Please do drop in to hear our stories and learn from all sorts of experienced beekeepers.

Honeybees are still buzzing inside the hives. They are busy protecting & keeping the queen warm. Bees are stay in a large cluster to keep the nest warm and they eat their home made bee bread & nectar that is stored in the combs. Plus, we beekeepers check on the hives monthly and top up their food with sugar fondant and white sugar during the cold winter months. Careful not to disturb the bee cluster. Must wear bee suits and gloves, use clean tools and a smoker. We follow a monthly beekeepers schedule recommended by the BC Honey Producers Association and learn from other beekeepers. Bee keeping course will be starting soon, so if interested please give me a call or email for more information.

Garden planning is important to start thinking about planning your garden now. West coast seed has a great supply of seeds and garden supplies. In their seed book they have grow charts and companion planting information that we use at Shulus Garden. We will be gearing up to start seedlings in March onward. Drop by the garden or phone me for more information.

Shulus Community Garden's Harvesting Station Upgrade

Shulus Community Garden Flourishes with Harvesting Station Upgrade

The Shulus Community Garden of the Lower Nicola Indian Band is celebrating the completion of its Harvesting Station upgrade. This transformative project, generously funded by Farm Credit Canada (FCC) with a \$22,000 investment, marks a pivotal moment for the community, resulting in enhanced agricultural practices and efficiency.

The Shulus Community Garden has long been a source of sustenance and growth. The garden provides produce for LNIB community health programs, produce for the community soup kitchen, elders' good food box program and more.

With generous support from FCC, the Harvesting Station upgrade introduces modernized equipment, streamlining the harvesting process and reducing manual labor. The Harvesting Station Upgrade included building a small shelter, upgrading drainage, servicing the shelter with water and electricity, purchasing shelves, sinks, storage bins and more. Work was performed by local contractors and garden staff with some in-kind hours provided by Public Works. The process was also helped by the tractor donated by the LNIB Development Corporation in 2023.

This project will allow staff at the garden to process the thousands of pounds of produce (beans, beets, cabbage, carrots, cauliflower, celery, cucumbers, leeks, lettuce, onions, peas, squash, zucchinis and more!), herbs (basil, chives, cilantro, mint, oregano, parsley, rosemary, sage, spearmint, summer savory tarragon, thyme) and over a hundred pounds of honey!

In 2024, the garden will be aiming to produce more for the community with the support of generous donors like FCC, the LNIB Development corporation and future funding opportunities. The garden will aim to expand on gardening workshops, volunteering programs that provide produce for hours, and more support for the programs and people it supports.

Lastly, if you feel yourself developing a green thumb, you can even create your own family veggie plot to grow your own produce. Save money, eat healthy and support local with the Shulus Community Garden!

Shulus Community Garden Survey

In the late fall of 2023, LNIB Economic Development and the Shulus Community Garden conducted a survey around the Shulus Community Garden. There were 95 responses, some questions had more than others. This exercise proved to be a good gauge of the sentiment around the Shulus Community Garden and LNIB Member current usage, future usage and what membership would like to see. The questions were crafted around the following themes:

- General Questions
- What would you like to see/purchase?
- Training/Volunteering
- Traditional Medicine
- Garden Plots/ Producing Your Own Food
- Garden Continuation

General Questions

Questions 1-5 were around garden visitation and receiving food from the garden.

- 88 of 94 responses indicated they are aware of the garden.
- 32 Visited, 5 volunteered, 3 worked, 1 attended training and 23 selected other.
- 50 responses indicated they had received fresh produce, while 45 did not.
- 26 respondents indicated they had purchased food, 10 used a food voucher and 23 had a voucher and purchased items
- 38 people received food or goods while 55 did not.

What would you like to see/purchase?

Questions 6-11 were around what people would like to see or if they would purchase more from the Garden.

- 86 respondents indicated that they would purchase vegetables from a garden stand.
- 90 respondents indicated they would purchase fruit from the hypothetical stand.
- 62 respondents indicated they would purchase preserved fruit, 78 said vegetables, 64 were interested in eggs and 46 were interested in pickled vegetables.
- Numerous responses indicated that they would like to see carrots, fruit, potatoes,
- 77 respondents indicated they would be interested in signing up for a seasonal food box, 16 said they are not.
- 51 respondents indicated they would like to see local season vegetables and produce, 39 indicated they would like things from the southern interior and 54 indicated a mix of local produce and meat.

Training/Volunteering

Questions 12-19 were around training.

- 83 respondents indicated that they have not taken any training at the garden while 9 have.
- Some of the training courses included gardening, beekeeping and honey extracting.
- 56 respondents indicated that they would take training while 33 would not.

- 49 respondents said they would take cooking classes while 41, said they would not.
- 64 respondents indicated they would be interested in learning about dehydration of fruits and vegetables while 28 would not.
- 69 respondents indicated they wuld be interested in learning how to cure meat or fish curing and drying while 22 said they are not.
- 36 respondents indicated they are interested in beekeeping while 54 were not.
- 34 responses entered text responses about learning about animal husbandry, the most common animal to raise was chickens.

Traditional Medicine

Questions 20 to 22 were around traditional medicine.

- 73 respondents indicated that they would be interested in traditional medicinal plant workshops hosted at the garden, while 18 were not.
- 63 respondents indicated that they were not aware of the mental health "green space" at the garden while 29 were aware.
- 72 respondents were not aware of the harvesting options at the garden while 20 were.

Garden Plots/ Producing Your Own Food/ Volunteering

Questions 23 to 27 were about garden plots and youth gardening.

- 37 respondents indicated that they would have their own garden plot while 53 would not.
- 75 respondents indicated that they would like a garden box at their home, while 13 would not.
- 90 respondents see the value of youth learning to produce their own food, while 1 person did not.
- 65 respondents indicated they would not be interested n volunteering with youth in the garden while 26 would be interested.
- Gardening, food preservation and summer programs were the most popular responses when respondents were asked about knowledge sharing with youth.

Garden Continuation

The last two questions were around the garden continuing to operate at LNIB:

- 90 respondents want the garden to continue, while 0 opposed.
- 90 respondents see value in the garden continuing in the future.

Conclusion

Overall, it appears that the garden is a legitimate source of food and medicine in the community. There appears to be a solid number of people who support the garden and would support more initiatives from it. There are many opportunities for people to take up gardening, harvest traditional medicine and learn more about food production and preservation.







INDIGENOUS WINTER WISDOM FOR LIFE!

Winter is an amazing season, so different from the others. In that way, it offers us it's own flavor of wisdom for life. Winter survival skills of indigenous peoples were developed over millennia of trial and error and so now, contain great wisdom. Much of the indigenous knowledge of how to get through winter falls into the following categories:

Store and transfer heat from fires

One of the tricks Native Americans used was to store heat from a campfire or cooking pit, both by heating rocks with it and by keeping coals alive for re-use.

Sharon Day, executive director of the Indigenous Peoples Task Force shared, "A pit would be built in the middle of the floor with rocks buried underneath the floor. When the rocks were heated, it would radiate the warmth." For life, our home, our family is the source of warmth for our hearts and we must tend it carefully to keep that warmth alive for us all.

Live campfire coals were also transported to a new campsite inside a fire horn or firepot — a covered or sealed vessel filled with fine ash and moss that could keep the coal going. This points us to how we need to value and carry love forward into each new place we go. A healthy heart is a good vessel for love.

Make use of winter's advantages

One of the themes that came up repeatedly was the degree to which indigenous people would treat winter weather not as an obstacle but an opportunity.

It can be a lot easier to travel and transport heavy loads on a sled over well-packed snow than it is to do the same across rough terrain with no roads. Frozen rivers were basically highways — totally flat, and free of obstacles. In life, we can use the same mindset for challenges and changes – opportunity instead of obstacle. Learn to evaluate and see where and how we can navigate to where we want to be.

And of course, there's food under those frozen highways — ice fishing was a major source of wintertime calories. In life we find support, sustenance to keep us going in all kinds of places, even those that look like they contain no life, might offer us a happy surprise when we look beneath the surface!

Dress in layers

All indigenous people in northern climes — from Canada's First Nations to the Finnish Sámi to Siberians — dress in layers to keep the cold at bay. These are often layers of skins and furs, where the furs are especially critical because they impart the same protection to humans that they do to the regional animals they're taken from. The hides and skins work well since leather is good as an outer layer for trapping body heat as well as giving some abrasion resistance, and underneath, an insulating down layer.

Life requires the same needs. We must have a mindset and abilities in place to tune in and understand each relationship so that we both preserve and nurture ourselves but also interact daily without rigid, heavy armour.

Take an ice bath

This may seem counterintuitive, but taking a quick dip in an icy bath can help you keep your core temperature up. The cold bath works by shocking your system so that you have less blood flow in the limbs and retain more core body heat. Sometimes we need to take the plunge in life to invigorate ourselves. Of course we must consider the plunge but initial discomfort should not always overrule the long-term benefits when we go to make the decision.

The other big advantage of deliberately exposing yourself to extremes of cold is that it builds up your tolerance for it. This increased cold tolerance will boost your ability to function outdoors, especially under stress. Here is the big positive for life because the principle is the same. When we encounter seasons with higher workload or stress, we can recognize that the potential to gain strength and resilience for ourselves can also buffer the journey in positive ways.

Plan ahead

A big part of indigenous winter preparations involves forecasting just how harsh the winter is likely to be. There are whole books written about different native traditions of watching certain types of animal, plant, and weather behavior as an indication that the coming winter will be more or less severe.

All of this forecasting is in the service of making plans for where to be, and on what timetable, and with what supplies. Ultimately, indigenous people didn't just prep for "winter" generically, but for the specific winter they thought was coming based on the signals they got from their environment. And here we see the wisdom of learning to forecast in our lives about specific situations and conditions in work, home, relationships. We are worth it so tuning into ourselves is simply treating ourselves and others as respectfully as we can.

Let the wisdom of winter sink deep into your bones but preferably do it around that cozy warm fire at home.

PROJECT UPDATE: SECURITY CAMERAS AND GATES

The Lands Department is responsible for the management and protection of all LNIB reserve lands. To prevent unlawful activity including dumping of hazardous materials and waste, as well as improper use of LNIB land, four gates were installed across Nicola Mameet IR1 in September of 2021.

SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT

After hours of hard work was done to cleanup various environmentally

contaminated areas on LNIB land, multiple gates were put in place to protect reserve lands.

CAMERAS

Security cameras were recently installed near important areas on reserve. Cameras are intended for security purposes only and will not interfere with the privacy of neighboring homes, businesses, and communities. The use of trail cameras is the best strategy for sites where it would not be appropriate to restrict access by installing a gate.

Members' access to reserve lands will not be restricted by gates though some areas may require gate codes. Contact the Lands Department during regular office hours to obtain a code.



DRAFT TRESPASS LAW OVERVIEW

PURPOSE

The purpose of this Law is to provide for the protection, management, use and possession of LNIB Land by:

- a. regulating the residence and access of individuals invited on LNIB Land; and
- b. prohibiting trespassers on LNIB Land.

ROLES AND DUTIES

Council	Enforcement Officer	Administrator

KEY TERMS IN THE LAW

"Interest" means an interest in LNIB Land, and includes an Allotment (or CP), Leasehold, and Easement, but for greater certainty does not include title to the land.

"Licence" means a licence, permit or other permission granted under this Land Code, or a licence or permit issued pursuant to the *Indian Act* prior to the effective date of this Land Code, to use, develop, or extract specified Natural Resources from, or otherwise have non-exclusive use of, LNIB Land but which does not grant an Interest in, or possession to, LNIB Land.

"Invited Guest" means a person authorized to:

- a. reside on LNIB Land because they have been invited to do so by an Inviter in accordance with paragraph 24.1(d) [Right of Tenancy] of the Land Code; or
- b. access LNIB Land because they have been invited to do so by an Inviter in accordance with paragraph 24.2(c) [Right of Access] of the Land Code.

"Inviter" means:

a. the following persons who are authorized to invite another person to reside on LNIB Lands:

- i. a Member who has been allocated a residential lot by Council under paragraph 24.1(a) [Right of Tenancy] of the Land Code; and
- ii. a Member with an Interest in LNIB Land, in accordance with paragraph 24.1(c) [Right of Tenancy] of the Land Code; and
- b. a holder of an Interest or a Licence in LNIB Lands who is authorized to invite another person to access LNIB Lands, in accordance with paragraph 24.2(a), (b) and (c) [Right of Access] of the Land Code;

PROHIBITION ORDER

If Council has reasonable grounds to believe that an Invited Guest poses a threat or may cause harm to the LNIB community or LNIB Land then Council may, by Band Council Resolution, revoke that right by issuing a Prohibition Order that prohibits the Invited Guest from residing on LNIB Lands, from accessing LNIB Lands, or both. The Order must be delivered to the individuals affected within 5 days and will be posted in public places. Individuals affected by the order can dispute it in writing.

TRESPASS PROHIBITED

A Person who does any of the following, without lawful authority or permission, commits an offence:

- a. enters onto or occupies a Premises if entry onto or occupation of the Premises is prohibited;
- b. enters onto, occupies or does not immediately leave a Premises after a Notice of Trespass, setting out that the Person's entry onto or occupation of the Premises is prohibited; or
- c. engages in or does not immediately stop an activity on or in a Premises, after being given a Notice of Trespass setting out that the activity they are or were engaging in is prohibited on or in the Premises.

NOTICE OF TRESPASS

Notice of Trespass may be given in one or more of the following ways:

- a. orally or in writing;
- b. by means of a sign or signs which are posted so that the signs:
 - are clearly visible;
 - ii. contain writing that is clearly legible, if any writing is used, to indicate a prohibition; and
 - ii. contain graphic representations that are clearly visible, if any graphic representation is used, to indicate a prohibition; or
- c. by Band Council Resolution posted in a public area and available at the LNIB administrative offices.

RATIFICATION

The Lands Department is planning to schedule community engagement meetings regarding the draft Trespass Law in January 2024 and the Chief and Council may consider ratifying the Law in February 2024. NOTICE TO COMMUNITY MEMBERS ON WILDLIFE SAFETY

Please refrain from leaving hunting remains, animals' entrails or trimmings up Mamit Lake Branch Road or anywhere near the community / residential areas.

Animal remains attract predators, leaving remains from a hunting trip too close to the community habituates the predators to keep returning for more food. Predators such as coyotes, bears and wolves will keep returning where there is food available to them. Attracting additional predators into the community will create an unsafe environment for children, pets, and all members of the community. Please relocate hunting remains or animal innards outside of the community by leaving them far away from residences or known industry. An alternative to Mamit Lake Branch Road could be up highway 97C, past the industrial park.

Monthly Invasive Weed Spotlight

Orange Hawkweed



Description:

Orange hawkweed is a perennial that grows bright flowers sprouting from rhizomes and short stolon's. It is one of 14 different species of hawkweed present in BC. This invasive is easily recognizable by these vibrant orange/red/yellow flower clusters growing from a single hairy stem that has minimal leaves. Flowers grow in clusters of 5-30 at the top of the stem, which may exude a milky latex when cut or picked. Hawkweed spreads via seed dispersal, root fragments and horizontal stolon's. The seeds are dark brown, ridged and cylindrical in shape, they can remain viable / dormant in the soil for up to 7 years before sprouting. This invasive weed is widespread throughout the province but is of particular concern in the Kootenay, Okanagan, Thompson, Cariboo, Omineca and Peace River regions.

Orange hawkweed will outcompete native species for water, nutrients, and light. This species can spread and grow in matt-like growth patterns, choking out native biodiversity by preventing other native plants from growing in the same area. Hawkweed grows well in disturbed locations, preferring coarse, well drained soils with minimal leaf litter. Most often identified along roadsides, pastures, rangeland, hayfields and specifically lawns.

Origin:

This invasive originated in Europe.

Control Options:

Prevention

- Reseed all areas where ground disturbance has occurred and minimize ground disturbance near invasive weeds.
- Remove seeds from gear, equipment, or vehicles before leaving a site. Clear Livestock of seed or plant fragments before changing pastures.

- Do not compost this plant, as root and stem fragments can continue to grow and resprout after being removed.
- Avoid tilling or digging near this weed as fragmented pieces can sprout into a new plant.

Mechanical Control

- Hand-pull small infestations, ensure the entire root system is removed and bag the removed plants to prevent root systems detaching and spreading.
- Goats are able to eat this invasive and repeated grazing can help hinder seed production and deplete root reserves.
- Mowing can help limit flower/seed production but should be avoided near disturbed ground or the weed may spread to those areas.

Chemical Control

- "The following active ingredients can control orange hawkweed: aminopyralid, metsulfuron, 2,4-D, clopyralid, dicamba, and picloram.
- For available products, contact your local Agri-supply store. Prior to any herbicide application, read and follow the label instructions." TNRD Orange Hawkweed
- Chemically treated plants can be left onsite to compost.

Disclaimer - ALL herbicide applications must be applied as spot spraying; broadcast spraying may negatively impact other vegetation in the area & harm sensitive ecosystems.

Herbicide application within 5m of a body of water (seasonal or not) is prohibited.

LNIB requesting that the application of herbicide to treat half an acre or more, is carried out by a person holding a valid BC Pesticide Applicator Certificate. Before selecting and applying herbicides, you must review and follow herbicide labels and application rates; municipal, regional, provincial, and federal laws and regulations; species-specific treatment recommendations, and site-specific goals and objectives.

ATTENTION HOUSING TENANTS

Please be advised that according to the Lower Nicola Indian Band Animal Control By-Law there is a limit on the number of animals per dwelling. Every home is only allowed to keep <u>A MAXIMUM OF 4 ANIMALS</u> consisting of dogs and cats or similar sized domestic animals with <u>A MAXIMUM OF 2 DOGS</u> per house. The multi-plex buildings including the 8-plex and 4-plex buildings are not permitted to have any animal living in the units. Also, all pets are to be vaccinated and should be spayed or neutered. We want to provide a safe environment for our members as well as their animals.

HOUSING ANNOUNCEMENT

SEPTIC SYSTEM MAINTENANCE

Your septic system is a living ecosystem, and you need to do your part to ensure it is healthy and working as it should.

Never put anything down the drain or toilet that will not biodegrade, including but not limited to, wipes (Lysol, baby, etc.), clothes, bottles, feminism products, paper towel, plastic, etc.

Don't use chemicals like bleach as it kills the good bacteria that breakdown the solid waste.

Space out your water consumption so the tank and drain field are not overwhelmed. By this we mean don't do excessive loads of laundry in a day, have extended showers, leave your tap running unnecessarily, etc.

The drain field (or leach field) is the area on your property where wastewater from your septic system is dispersed into the soil. To avoid damaging the drain field and overall functioning of the septic system; - Never park a vehicle, build a structure, have large livestock animals, have fires, or plant trees or a garden over your septic system's drain field - You should also prevent excess water from flowing over your drain field by making sure your downspouts are pointing away from it because a saturated field cannot drain and process wastewater.

These are some of the simple steps that can save time and money and extend the life of your septic system.

With temperatures starting to drop and colder days, and nights, ahead we would like to take this opportunity to remind you that it is time to detach your garden hose from your outside tap.

If you haven't already done so, please, think about doing it in the next few weeks. As overnight temperatures have started to dip close to freezing.





If you leave the hose on and it freezes it can cause the internal workings of the faucet to crack. This is what causes those leaking outside faucets come spring time.

Also if there is an independent shut off for your outside faucets we strongly recommend turning them off over the winter. This will further ensure no damage to the outside faucet and reduce any risk of it leaking inside your home.
