henle? Band members and community members. I hope everyone is doing well as we embark on our Spring season here on our beautiful lands. These past few months have been quite challenging I must say. First and foremost, I want to apologize for no newsletter submission for the month of April. March and April have not been very good months for me health wise. I am currently recovering from pneumonia and influenza A. As many of you may know, there were a lot of illness throughout our community and abroad. As I understand, there are still many

of our members suffering from this "Flu bug." Please take care of yourself and be cautious of this viral infection that is still very active everywhere. We cannot be too careful and take this virus for granted. I would encourage everyone to wash your hands regularly and wear a mask, if need be, when out and about whether you are shopping or just out in the general public.

Chief and Council have been meeting regularly and have been progressing with two major projects as of late. LNIB is currently engaging with Enbridge regarding the Sunrise Expansion Project and Capstone, who is our partner in the Mount Mable Wind Power Project. These are very exciting opportunities for LNIB and there is a lot of work that needs to be undertaken in the very near future. LNIB is hoping to invite Capstone to a community meeting very soon to introduce the project and talk about the opportunities that can come out of it. LNIB will be lobbying for employment for our membership as well as contractual work for band businesses as well. So far, our discussions with these two groups have been both positive and promising, but most importantly, these discussions have been respectful. We will continue these discussions and LNIB hopes to have more concrete information to share with the membership in due course.

LNIB took part in a momentous celebration this past month with our neighboring nations. The Nicola Native Lodge Society and Board of Directors did its official ribbon cutting of the building. I was honored and privileged to take part in this ceremony, which included prayers from both our Syilx and Nłe?kepmx elders, Nancy Saddleman and Art Sam. We also had some amazing hand drumming to help open things up. The grand opening took place right at the site and it also included a brief tour of the building where we were able to see what some of the living units look like. This Lodge has been a long time coming for all the nations of the Nicola Valley. Although

there had to be some modifications with the makeup of the Lodge, the Nicola Valley leadership is extremely proud of the outcome. The lodge is made up of 52 living units and there are optional units to help accommodate for certain aspects of day-to-day living, for example our elderly. It's an exciting time for our people. Many people who volunteered their time to sit on the Nicola Native Lodge Board of Directors since the Board's inception were recognized as well. LNIB had several Board members over the years. A few past members that come to mind are Maggie Shuter and Gloria Moses. I want to thank these ladies for their hard work and vision. The Nicola Native Lodge would not be here if it weren't for their hard work and dedication and participation.

There are definitely some exciting times on the horizon for LNIB. LNIB is in the driver seat with regards to economic development opportunities. We are advocating for housing for our people with our new Nicola Native Lodge building. Things are looking positive, and I am very proud of the work we are doing. Although there is much to be proud of, it also comes with some sadness for many of us. It is with great sadness that I mention some of our community's losses this past month. LNIB lost a pivotal person not only in our community, but in our administration. I lost a dear friend on April 6, 2025, Leesa Mike. Leesa was a significant impact for LNIB. Leesa was a visionary and dedicated her life to LNIB. I will miss you dearly Leesa, rest easy my friend. We also lost a highly respected elder in Joyce Dick. Joyce was a strong advocate for LNIB membership. Joyce was not afraid to speak up for the elders and the people of LNIB. LNIB will miss your huge smile and your soft presence Joyce. My much love and sincere condolences to the family and your loss.

Remember that Spring is here!!! Let's enjoy May and enjoy the time we can spend with friends and family. Let's take care of one another and be thankful for another day to appreciate yourself, your worth and your will. The flowers are blooming, the water is flowing, and the grass is growing. Let us appreciate life and what life gives us. Much love and respect to all of you.

concerned. We are committed to keeping the community and employees safe. Lower Nicola Indian Band had no new employees starting in the month of April 2025. There were no employees who moved on from LNIB in the month of April 2025.

Current job postings with Lower Nicola Indian Band are Receptionist, Cultural Heritage and Environmental Field Workers, Fisheries Technician, Geographic Information Analyst, Policy Analyst, School Counsellor, Teacher K-7 School, Housing Maintenance Assistant, Community Nurse (1 year contract), Counsellor (focused on male clientele), Youth Program Coordinator and Summer students for Administration Assistant/ Accounting and Reception/Administration Assistant. Committees and Liaisons: The Lands Management Advisory Committee did not meet in April 2025. WATER RESTRICTIONS

Level 3 WATER RESTRICTIONS

LNIB's current water management plan is to maintain LEVEL 3 WATERING RESTRICTIONS YEAR-ROUND as part of an effort to reduce the likelihood of highly restrictive levels 4 and 5 during drought season. This enables residents to keep their lawns green during fire season According to the Province of BC, British Columbia continues to get less rain and snow than usual and that's having a lasting impact on water levels. The province as a whole, experienced severe drought the last two years and remains at risk this year. Level Three Watering restrictions limit lawn watering to 2 TIMES a week. Hand watering or drip-irrigating gardens (not lawns) and washing with an auto shut-off valve is permitted anytime.

OTHER WATER USAGE

WASHING & HAND WATERING: HAND WATERING OF PLANTS (EXCLUDING LAWNS), WASHING VEHICLES, OR POWER WASHING WITH A USER-CONTROLLED FLOW NOZZLE WITH SHUT-OFF VALVE IS PERMITTED AT ANYTIME DURING LEVEL 3 WATERING RESTRICTIONS. LNIB RECOMMENDS THAT RESIDENTS WASH VEHICLES OVER GRASS OR GRAVEL WHEN POSSIBLE SO THAT RUN OFF WATER DRAINS INTO THE EARTH INSTEAD OF DOWN THE DRAINS.

DRIP IRRIGATION: WATERING OF GARDENS, SUCH AS VEGETABLE GARDENS, WITH A DRIP IRRIGATION SYSTEM IS PERMITTED AT ANYTIME. TO LIMIT WATER DISSIPATION IN THE HEAT OF THE DAY, LNIB RECOMMENDS SCHEDULING ALL WATERING FOR THE EARLY MORNING OR LATE EVENINGS. POOLS, SPAS, & PONDS: AT THIS TIME, RESIDENTS MAY ONLY TOP UP SWIMMING POOLS, SPAS, OR PONDS.

Please refrain from leaving animals' hunting remains, entrails or trimmings up Mamit Lake Branch Road or anywhere near community the residential areas.

Animal remains attract predators, leaving remains from a hunting trip too close to the community habituates the predators to keep returning food. for more Predators such as coyotes, bears and wolves will keep returning where there is food available to them. Attracting additional predators into the community will create an unsafe environment for children, pets, and all members of the community. Please relocate hunting remains or animal innards outside of the community by leaving them far away from residences or known industry. An alternative to Mamit Lake Branch Road could be up highway 97C, past the industrial park.




Snukwe? Security is on duty 40 hours each week and responds to calls and messages while on shift.

The securiguard is here to assist as needed and monitor any issues reported by residents, such as noise, nuisances, illegal dumping and general safety concerns.

If you or anyone else is in Immediate danger or emergency situation, please CALL 911 FIRST.

The Lands Department oversees the management and protection of LNIB reserve lands, ensuring their sustainability and security for the community. To address concerns such as the improper use of land and the illegal dumping of hazardous materials, measures have been implemented to safeguard these valuable areas.









Camera Installation

To complement the gate system, security cameras have been placed in key locations throughout the reserve. These cameras are strictly for monitoring and security purposes, ensuring the safety of the lands without infringing on the privacy of nearby homes, businesses, or communities. Trail cameras are used in areas where gate installation would be impractical, providing a flexible yet effective solution.

Gates for Land Protection

In September 2021, four gates were installed across Nicola Mameet IR1. These gates serve as a barrier to prevent unauthorized activities while still allowing controlled access. While members of the community retain full access to reserve lands, some areas may require gate codes for entry.

The installation of gates follows a dedicated effort to clean up areas contaminated by environmental hazards. These measures are essential to preserving the health and safety of the reserve lands for current and future generations.

Members' access to reserve lands will not be restricted by the GATES, though some areas may require gate codes.

Yellow Flag Iris

Iris pseduacorus







"Can be toxic to humans and animals and cause human skin irritations-Invasive" -Invasive Species Council of BC

Origin:

This invasive weed originated in Europe, Western Asia and North Africa.

Description:

Commonly known as the Water flag Iris, this invasive weed is prolific in invading wet ecosystems from roadside ditches and shallow ponds to sensitive wetlands and streams. This invasive weed spreads multiple ways: Seed dispersal allows floating seeds to move throughout aquatic ecosystems, by water currents / movement. Flag Iris can also spread through tuber root systems growing horizontally to create entirely new plants adjacent to the parent plant. Hundreds of plants or more can all grow from the same extensive root systems. This root systems creates a dense matt of roots, stifling other aquatic plants, reducing water flow and degrading natural habitat for other species. Root fragments, broken off of the main root body can also become dislodged from the main plant and transported through water currents to then continue to grow, eventually becoming an entirely new plant as well. Large infestations of Yellow Flag Iris will outcompete native plant species via overcrowding and negative habitat alternation. The extensive root systems can begin to slowly elevate the soil over time through compaction and eventually the overall topography of the area can become elevated / dried out, making the habitat no longer suitable for beneficial native aquatic species to grow.

Since this invasive is particularly damaging to natural ecosystems, toxic to humans / animals and <mark>sprea</mark>ds rapidly, it has earned a designation of a provincial noxious wee<mark>d by the BC Wee</mark>d Control Act and a Containment/ Control species by the BC Provincial Priority Invasive Species List.

Control Options:

Prevention

- Educate gardeners and individuals on the risks of Flag Iris to prevent intentional establishment for ornamental purposes.
- Do not compost this plant, as root fragments can continue to grow and resprout after being removed.
- Monitoring programs can be established to try and identify early signs of Flag Iris in aquatic / riparian zones, so that it may be controlled before spreading further or infesting an entire area.
- Avoid tilling or random digging near this weed as fragmented pieces can sprout into a new plant.
- Ensure no seeds or root fragments are attached to clothing / equipment when leaving a site.



Cultural Control

- Burning is likely an ineffective tool for this weed as it grows primarily in wet areas, with 'wet feet', meaning their roots are generally submerged in water and would be unaffected by fire.
- This weed is known to be toxic to humans and animals alike so using livestock to eat the plant is not a good option.
- Plant native plant species in disturbed riparian zones or for ornamental purposes in your water garden as an alternative.



Mechanical Control

- Hand-pulling small infestations is effective, ensure the entire root system is removed and bag the removed plants before disposing of them in the landfill. This is important to prevent root systems detaching and spreading during transportation. Wear Gloves and long sleeves to avoid contact with this plant!
- Ensure hand pulling methods are done with caution to avoid skin irritation as well as small fragments of root breaking off and forming a new plant.
- The Benthic Barrier approach involves mowing patches of Flag iris down to its base and then placing a thick rubber mat over the roots to prevent the rhizomes from growing.
- Flowers should be clipped off to prevent seed production.



Chemical Control

• No Chemical control is available for this invasive due to the offset requirements of all herbicide/ pesticide from bodies of water, seasonal or otherwise. This is necessary for the protection of sensitive aquatic species and sources of drinking water.







Disclaimer - ANY & ALL herbicide applications must be applied as spot spraying; broadcast spraying may negatively impact other vegetation in the area & harm sensitive ecosystems.

Herbicide application within 5m of any body of water (seasonal or not) is prohibited.

LNIB is requesting that the application of herbicide to treat half an acre or more, is carried out by a pe<mark>rson holding a v</mark>alid BC Pesticide Applicator Certificate. Before selecting and applying herb<mark>icides, you must</mark> review and follow herbicide labels and application rates; municipal, regional, provincial, and federal laws and regulations; species-specific treatment recommendations, and site-specific goals and objectives.

Plant me instead!

Instead of Flag Iris, here are some great native species that you can plant as an alternative to support ecosystems health & biodiversity in your garden.

Septic System Maintenance

DO NOT USE KIRKLAND BRAND TOILET PAPER, as it does not break down and clogs the toilet.

Your septic system is a living ecosystem, and you need to do your part to ensure it is healthy and working as it should.

Never put anything down the drain or toilet that will not biodegrade, including but not limited to, wipes (Lysol, baby, etc.), clothes, bottles, feminism products, paper towel, plastic, etc.

Don't use chemicals like bleach as it kills the good bacteria that breakdown the solid waste.

Space out your water consumption so the tank and drain field are not overwhelmed. By this we mean don't do excessive loads of laundry in a day, have extended showers, leave your tap running unnecessarily, etc.

The drain field (or leach field) is the area on your property where wastewater from your septic system is dispersed into the soil. To avoid damaging the drain field and overall functioning of the septic system; -Never park a vehicle, build a structure, have large livestock animals, have fires, or plant trees or a garden over your septic system's drain field - You should also prevent excess water from flowing over your drain field by making sure your downspouts are pointing away from it because a saturated field cannot drain and process wastewater.

These are some of the simple steps that can save time and money and extend the life of your septic system.
