There were many good comments and questions that came from the members that were in attendance that evening. Capstone is committed to working closely with LNIB and is happy to provide any information membership desire regarding the project. Capstone is also willing to facilitate an "on-site" field trip for any members interested in the Spring of 2026. On another note, LNIB and Capstone have agreed to investigate another wind power opportunity in the Tulameen area! Details of this initiative will be announced in the near future soon through another engagement session with LNIB membership. There are some exciting times ahead for our community with major projects. These opportunities could just be the tip of the iceberg for LNIB, and I look forward to the discussions and challenges ahead.

NIB is currently in a very good position with major projects and economic development opportunities. We are dealing with wind power at Mount Mable and Tulameen. We are implementing the terms and conditions of our Impacts and Benefits Agreement with Highland Valley Copper Mine. We want to fully participate in the HVC Mine Life Extension Project that will provide contracts, jobs, and revenue streams. We are engaging in discussions and negotiations with Enbridge and the Sunrise Expansion Project. We want to put some effort into a potential purchase of the Trans Mountain Pipeline with neighboring Nations. These are just a few things this Chief and Council have been working on, and we hope to get these projects across the finish line in due time.

Whereas the parcel title is registered in the name of 1374678 B.C. Ltd., a corporation whose shares are legally owned by Arthur Dick, Stuart Jackson and Connie Joe on behalf of LNIB. The State of Title Certificate is attached as Schedule "A".

Whereas the Lands are currently zoned CR-1 (Country Residential) and part is zoned SH-1 (Small Holding). The intended use of the proposed reserve land is to extend the Rocky Pines community subdivision which is adjacent to the Lands.

Whereas the parcel of land is required for community additions.

Whereas this proposal falls under the Community Additions category outlined in Directive 10-1, Section 9.2 of the Additions to Reserve/Reserve Creation Policy (2016).

Whereas the LNIB completed the Reserve Creation Application Form, dated September 2, 2025, which includes supporting materials.

Now therefore be it resolved that LNIB requests that the land described herein be set apart as reserve for the use and benefit of LNIB.

- 2. The purpose of the Cardex project is to map unsurveyed interests known as Cardex Holdings and explore solutions for how these interests can be accurately represented in the new First Nation Land Governance Registry ("FNLGR:). The project will involve in-depth discussions and collaboration to address legacy issues, strengthen research, and develop approaches for identifying and mapping unsurveyed interests. This work will prepare LNIB for the transition from the existing First Nation Land Registry System ("FNLRS") to the new FNLGR.

For clarification purposes according to the Land Management Manual "Cardex Holdings are a historical individual interest in reserve land created by a Band Council Resolution and approved by the Minister, pursuant to section 20(1) of the Indian Act. Although the parcel of land is not surveyed, the Band Council Resolution is registered in the Indian Land Registry System by the Registrar who will issue a No Evidence of Title. Cardex Holdings are no longer issued, however, existing interests remain active. Land descriptions related to Cardex Holdings were often vague and inaccurate. While Cardex Holdings are registered in the Indian Lands Registry, a proper survey must be done before any further transactions can take place on the particular land. A Cardex Holder is a person who is in lawful possession of land."

- Cardex Holdings continue to present challenges for LNIB land management. Many parcels
 tied to these holdings lack proper surveys, rely on vague descriptions, or contain
 inconsistencies between records. This creates uncertainty for Cardex holders and delays
 land transactions, leases, or financing.
- 4. First Nations Land Management Resource Center is offering a Legacy Issues Funding Opportunity to support with Legacy Issues related to survey cost, administration fees and professional fees in updating of Cardex Holdings records to ensure accuracy and alignment with LNIB's Land Code.
- 5. LNIB Council recognizes the importance of accurate land records for effective governance, land management, and member interests.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT THE CHIEF AND COUNCIL:



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- Approves and supports the submission of an application to the First Nations Land Management Resource Center who is offering of a Legacy Issues Funding Opportunity to address the Cardex Holdings issues and that LNIB commits to the implementation of the Cardex project ensuring proper oversight, accountability, and reporting.
- 2. Authorizes the Lands Department to carry out activities required under the project, including coordination with First Nations Land Management Resource Centre and other agencies/professionals as needed.

WHEREAS LNIB and Teck HVC did not have any agreements in place between them regarding the Mine until they entered into a Relationship Agreement dated July 22, 2016 (the "2016 Agreement").

WHEREAS Teck HVC intends to expand the scope of the Mine and extend the duration of mining activities from the originally planned Mine closure date in 2028 until approximately 2045, which is referred to as the Mine Life Extension.

WHEREAS the Mine Life Extension and the continued operation of the Mine will significantly impact LNIB's Aboriginal Rights and Title and LNIB's lands and waters. LNIB has attempted to



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address those impacts through participation in the BC Environmental Assessment Office review of the Mine Life Extension and through negotiation of an Impact Benefit Agreement with Teck HVC which would replace the 2016 Agreement (the "2025 Agreement").

WHEREAS the LNIB Negotiating Committee and HVC have come to agreement on the terms of the 2025 Agreement, subject to the approval of the 2025 Agreement by Chief and Council.

WHEREAS Council has reviewed the terms of the 2025 Agreement and other information provided by the LNIB Negotiating Committee, and are satisfied that:

- the 2025 Agreement will provide significant ongoing financial payments, employment and contracting benefits which far exceed the benefits contained in the 2016 Agreement;
- the 2025 Agreement includes measures which will help address and mitigate the impacts
 of the Mine on LNIB's Aboriginal Rights and Title and LNIB's lands and waters; and
- execution of the 2025 Agreement is in the best interest of the LNIB community and offers the best option for addressing the impacts of the Mine.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

- Lower Nicola Indian Band Chief and Council approves the terms of the 2025 Agreement and authorizes the execution of the 2025 Agreement, substantially in the form as presented to Chief and Council.
- 2. Any member of Council is hereby authorized and approved to do all such further acts, engage in all such communication, and prepare, deliver and execute all other documents as may be required in order to give effect to this Band Council Resolution.

This Band Council Resolution is supported by the undersigned in a duly convened meeting and passed this <u>23rd</u> day of <u>September 2025</u>.

RE: Tulameen Wind

WHEREAS the Lower Nicola Indian Band operates under the authority of Chief and Council.

WHEREAS LNIB successfully partnered with Capstone Power Corp. ("Capstone") in the 2024 BC Hydro call for power, and LNIB and Capstone were awarded an electricity purchase agreement with respect to the Mount Mabel Wind Project. LNIB and Capstone are currently developing the Mount Mabel Wind Project.

WHEREAS Capstone is investigating another potential wind project located north of Princeton BC, known as the Tulameen Wind Project. Capstone wishes to partner with LNIB in exploring and developing the Tulameen Wind Project, and wishes to submit a proposal in response to the 2025 BC Hydro call for power. If successful, Capstone and LNIB would construct and operate the Tulameen Wind Project to provide renewable energy to BC Hydro.

WHEREAS Capstone has offered to provide LNIB with equity ownership in the Tulameen Wind Project, along with certain other benefits, all of which are outlined in the draft Term Sheet "Co-Ownership in the Project Co. Project Binding Term Sheet" ("Term Sheet"). The provisions of this Term Sheet are substantially similar to the Mount Mabel Wind Project Term Sheet.

WHEREAS Chief and Council have reviewed the Term Sheet and information regarding the



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Tulameen Wind Project, and have received the advice of LNIB staff and advisors regarding the Term Sheet and the Tulameen Wind Project.

WHEREAS Chief and Council have determined that the Term Sheet and participation in the Tulameen Wind Project would provide LNIB and its members with significant ongoing revenue, employment and contracting benefits, all on favourable financial and legal terms.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

- 1. Lower Nicola Indian Band Chief and Council approves, in principle, of LNIB's participation in the Tulameen Wind Project as generally outlined in the Term Sheet.
- 2. Lower Nicola Indian Band Chief and Council authorize the further investigation and development of the Tulameen Wind Project, and authorize LNIB Council Members, advisors and representatives to take such further steps as may be necessary to negotiate the Term Sheet with Capstone and to prepare the submission of the Tulameen Wind Project to the 2025 BC Hydro call for power.
- 3. The final draft of the Term Sheet and any other commercial agreements with Capstone shall be brought back to Chief and Council for review and approval.
- 4. Any member of Council is hereby authorized and approved to do all such further acts, engage in all such communication, and prepare, deliver and execute all other documents as may be required in order to give effect to this Band Council Resolution.


Chief and Council Attendance Term October 2022-September 2025







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Chief and Council Attendance Term October 2022-September 2025


delivery of curriculum. Our new goals include increasing our hours of operation and increasing suitable space for infants/parents..we look forward to sharing updates on these new goals as they progress.



CAMERAS & GATES

In September 2021, four gates were installed on Nicola Mameet IR1 to prevent unauthorized activity while allowing controlled access. Two gates are on Mamit Lake Branch Road near the speedway, one at the top of Mamit Lake Branch Road, and one at the 4 Mile Corrals. Some areas may require a gate code. Trail and security cameras have also been set up to monitor gate use and help prevent illegal dumping, without affecting the privacy of nearby homes or businesses.

NOTICE TO COMMUNITY MEMBERS ON WILDLIFE SAFETY

Please refrain from leaving hunting remains, animals' entrails or trimmings up Mamit Lake Branch Road or anywhere near the community / residential areas.

Leaving animal remains from hunting trips too close to the community attracts predators such as coyotes, bears, and wolves. When predators find easy food sources, they become habituated and will continue returning, increasing the risk to children, pets, and all community members. To help keep the community safe, please dispose of hunting remains or animal innards far from homes and industrial areas. A recommended alternative location is up Highway 97C, past the industrial park, rather than along Mamit Lake Branch Road.

NOTICE OF GATE & SIGN INSTALLATION HAMILTON IR NO. 7


This notice is to inform LNIB Members of the Intended Installation of 2 gates, along with supporting signage, at the two main access roads into Hamilton IR No. 7 this October.


Workshops and Cultural Learning

The Nlaka'pamux Environmental Management Program (NEMP) was initiated by the Lower Nicola Indian Band (LNIB) to care for the land in a holistic way.
